

KAISER ADVISES WAR IN TIME OF PEACE

EMPEROR OF GERMANY REFERS TO TEACHINGS OF QUEEN LOUISE AS EXAMPLE.

Koenigsberg, East Prussia, Aug. 26.—Emperor William, who is making a tour of eastern Germany in connection with his visit to Posen for the dedication of his new castle there, delivered a martial speech at the provincial banquet here last night, in which he urged the necessity of co-operation with him in his work for the welfare and defense of the country.

Taking as a text the role of Queen Louise of Prussia during the Napoleonic wars he exploited her virtues and pointed out how the memory of her had fired the courage of Prussian soldiers and saved the country.

"The lofty figure of Queen Louise teaches," he said, "that we men should cultivate all the military virtues and be always willing to use them in defense of the country. Above all else it teaches us to maintain the equipment of our army, in view of the enormous strides made by our neighbors, for on being prepared for war does our peace depend."

In the course of his long speech the emperor alluded to Emperor William I. of Germany in terms indicating the identity of his convictions with those of his grandfather.

"My grandfather," he said, "again by his right, placed the Prussian crown on his head and again proclaimed it to be bestowed on him by God's grace alone and not by parliaments, assemblies, people or elections of the people, and that he saw in himself the chosen instrument of heaven, and as such he regarded his duty as regent and ruler."

German women, said the emperor, should learn from Queen Louise that their duty did not lie in participating in public meetings nor in society nor in attaining supposed rights in which they might be able to do the same as men, "but in quiet work at home and in the family they should train the young generations before all things in obedience and respect towards old age. They should make it clear to their children and to their children's children that they should not strive to live at the cost of others, nor at the cost of their fatherland, but that on the contrary they should have the fatherland alone in mind, devoting all their strength and intelligence to the welfare of the country."

In closing the emperor said: "Considering myself as the instrument of the Master, regardless of passing views and opinions, I go my way, which is solely devoted to the prosperity and peaceful development of our fatherland."

Seattle, Aug. 26.—Federal warrants charging conspiracy to use the mails to defraud were issued today for the arrest of Clarence D. Hillman, a millionaire real estate man; Samuel S. Sutter, head salesman employed by Hillman; T. F. Keeley, manager of his Everett office; and H. C. Pott, who conducts another local agency.

Hillman and his associates are well known in real estate circles on Puget sound, having established many town-sites.

Alleged irregularities in the advertisement of land sales led to an investigation by inspectors, who filed the information upon which the warrants were issued.

Washington, Aug. 26.—A reward of \$500 is offered by the war department for the capture of robbers, who carried off a safe and \$6,428.26 from Camp Otis, Wyo., on the night of August 9.

The safe and its contents were guarded by a sergeant, a corporal, a musician and three colored troopers of the Ninth cavalry. The thief was reported the next morning, when Paymaster Wilder came to pay off the Utah regiments, which had been in maneuvers at Camp Otis. The guard is under arrest.

Two days before the robbery the safe contained \$50,000.

Warren, Pa., Aug. 26.—Waiving a hearing on information charging them with conspiracy to defraud the electors of Warren county, Joseph C. Sibley, who recently resigned as candidate for congress on the republican ticket in the Twenty-eighth congressional district of this state, Frank B. Taylor of Franklin, Charles D. Crandall, George B. Munn and D. M. Howard of this county were held for court trial today by Justice of the Peace Perry.

Mr. Sibley, who, according to a physician's certificate is confined to his home in Franklin with acute heart trouble, was not present.

MARKET MOVEMENT OF THE DAY

New York, Aug. 26.—On the smallest overturn in business this week, today's stock market made a general recovery from the declines of yesterday, when rumors of frost in the northwest precipitated a general selling movement. These rumors were dispelled today and the decline in corn options resulted in a strong recovery.

Americans rallied in the London market and there was later buying here. Foreign exchange here, raised earlier. Indications point to a small cash gain for the week by the banks in their operations with the subtreasury, but inasmuch as many direct shipments of currency have been made to interior points and Canada the supposed gain may readily be turned into a loss.

Bank clearings in the aggregate all over the country show a continued shrinkage, the loss for the week being over 20 per cent, compared with last year. The reduced volume of clearings is again chiefly due to the market falling off in this city, while Chicago, Pittsburg, Cleveland, Baltimore, Kansas City and San Francisco all report increases.

The bond market was steady. Total sales, par value, \$763,000.

Grain and Provisions. Chicago, Aug. 26.—The wheat market today was unimpressive, with no marked bullish or bearish stimulus. The slump in corn, the reverse of yesterday's performance, when shorts

rushed to cover on fears of immediate frost damage, took the strain off the bulls and fluctuations were comparatively narrow with a downward tendency. Receipts here and in the northwest were large. The close was easy all around with September 1/2c to 1/4c to 1/2c down, at 98 1/2c, after having moved between 99 1/2c and 98 1/2c; December closed 1/2c to 1/4c off, at 1.03 1/2c. Oats were affected by the weakness in corn, but fell away less sharply. Cash oats declined 1/4c to 1/2c and September was heavy. The close was weak and near the bottom, with September 1/4c off, at 34 1/2c; December closed 1/4c off, at 35 1/2c. Pork finished 2 1/2c up to the down; lard was unchanged to 1/2c down, and ribs 1/2c up. Closing prices for the September products: Pork, \$21.02 1/2; lard, \$11.97 1/2; unchanged; ribs, \$12.25, 5c up.

Call for Republican State Convention. The executive committee of the republican state central committee, by authorization of the said state central committee, at a meeting held at the city of Helena, Montana, Saturday, June 18, 1910, has directed that the republican state convention be held Thursday, September 15, 1910, at Missoula, Montana, as designated by said state central committee, at noon, at the Missoula opera house, for the purpose of placing in nomination candidates for the following offices: One representative in congress. One railroad commissioner. One clerk of the supreme court.

And for the transaction of such other business as may properly come before the convention. The republican electors of the several counties, and all other electors, without regard to past party affiliations, who believe in the principles of the republican party and who endorse its policies, are cordially invited to unite under this call in the holding of primaries and conventions for the purpose of electing delegates and alternates to said state convention. Said convention shall consist of delegates and alternate delegates for the several counties as follows:

Second—In the absence of any delegate and his alternate a majority of the delegation from that county shall cast the vote of the absentee. Third—In the absence of all the delegates and alternate delegates from any county, no vote shall be cast from such county. Fourth—In the county in which the state convention is held no vote shall be cast for an absent delegate or his alternate.

Fifth—Delegates and alternate must be republicans and residents of the county which they represent. Sixth—All notices of contests shall be submitted in writing, accompanied by a statement setting forth the grounds of the contest, which shall be filed with the secretary of the state central committee at least one day prior to the meeting of the convention.
