Yesterday morning the Polleys mill was "turned around" just to see that the machinery was thrown in a little at a time, until the whole plant was in operation. There was not a click or a flicker anywhere; everything ran as smoothly as if the plant had been in operation for a month. The big belts took the load and piled it upon the engine just like old people. The exhibition was very gratifying and demonstrated the excellence of the work of the millwrights, as well as the correctness of the manufacturers. "In the whole plant," said Mr. Polleys yesterday, "there was not a bit of shifting or a pulley or a key that did not fit to a hairbreadth. It was the finest piece of work I have ever seen turned out. You can see the way it is running." There are a few logs in the pond at the mill, which were brought in over the Milwaukee, and the logging train is ready for business; cars have been equipped and before the end of the week the mill will be in active operation.

POSITIONS SECURED FOR STUDENTS

EMPLOYMENT COMMITTEE OF THE UNIVERSITY REPORTS PROGRESS.

The work of the student employment committee of the university during the past summer has been a notable and successful feature of the campaign of the state school for a larger attendance. Through the efforts of this committee, composed of Professors E. C. Scheuch and L. C. Plant, positions have been secured for students who would otherwise have been unable to attend school, and a number of deserving boys will be enabled to secure a college education as a result of the tireless work of the men.

"I want to thank the business men for the courtesy which they have shown us," said Professor Plant last night. "We have been treated with consideration by all with whom we have talked, and the co-operation of the business men has helped us wonderfully. A common remark has been, 'I have noticed the account of your campaign in the papers and have been thinking it over to see if I can't find work for a boy or two.'"

Secretary Bretstein of the chamber of commerce has also helped us a great deal by visiting the business men with us and by individual effort as well. We have not been able to see everybody because of the fact that some of the business men have been out of town or out of their offices when we have called to see them. I wish to say, however, that if any of those whom we have been unable to talk will telephone to the university, in case they have any room for a student assistant, it will be greatly appreciated, and a member of the committee will call on them at once for further particulars.

"We have received a large number of inquiries from prospective students as to the opportunities for employment, and we will doubtless need all of the positions we can get. Some of the students desiring employment have already arrived, the advice given them being to get here early, and others are expected soon.

"The committee will personally watch over each student for whom a position is secured, and every effort will be made to see that satisfactory work is done.

"It has been rather difficult to get employment for the girls as clerks or bookkeepers, but there are plenty of opportunities for young ladies to live as members of the family in different homes in the city. This is a plan by which many girls in the larger eastern universities attend college, and is an admirable one to my mind. Several of the faculty members have expressed their willingness to provide employment for a girl in this way."

Professor Plant could give no figures as to the probable number of students who would need employment, but he expressed no doubt but that there would be enough to supply all positions.
