**FINE FIRE DRILLS**  
**AT WILLARD**

**PUPILS PASS OUT IN PERFECT ORDER IN EXACTLY ONE MINUTE OF TIME.**

One of the things which is being given special attention by the teachers of Missoula's public schools is the fire drill at the various buildings. The importance of this drill is recognized everywhere the last few years, and the Missoula schools have been right in the van of the procession. Drills are frequent at every building and the training has been so thorough that the schools are empty of children in an incredibly short period.

Yesterday one of the best records ever made in the city was established at the Willard school. This building is of eight rooms and there are approximately 260 pupils attending. Yesterday there was a fire alarm sounded and in exactly one minute every pupil and all of the teachers were outside the building. The drill was conducted with perfect order and shows the results of proper attention having been given to the drills.

**BIG GRAY GRIZZLY GORMANDIZES**

**BRUIN BEATS THE BRUSH AND BAGS BOVINES—BITES BULLETS.**

Bear stories are emanating from the Missoula forest. They come from rangers and from guards and during the last few days they have reached the local forestry headquarters and started out again from the supervisor's office. The stories are not about the little black and brown bears which are numerous in this locality, but they are concerning a big grizzly. The first rumors of bruin placed him at an enormous size, but he has been growing steadily every day until now by actual measurement he is the largest bear that has ever been sighted in these parts. He has struck terror to the hearts of the residents of the district through which he has chosen to roam lately and his favorite pastime is killing sheep and cattle. The last reports of the bear came in a few days ago after a rain, when one of the rangers sent word that he had found the trail, and that the footprints measured 12 inches in length and nearly as wide.

At first the bear was thought to be a joke, but upon the continued complaints of the stockmen the truth of the assertions were investigated by Supervisor D. G. Kinney of the Missoula forest. He found most of them well founded, and, as a result, has detailed one man from his crew, known to be a crack rifle shot, to hunt down the big grizzly and lay him low. The bear has been operating and makes his home at the head of Black creek, and as a grizzly will, seems to have gone on a stock slaughtering raid. His death is anxiously anticipated by all of the stockmen in that section of the country.

**TELEPHONE CREWS EAST AND WEST**

**SENT OUT YESTERDAY BY BELL COMPANY—ONE REPAIRING, THE OTHER BUILDING.**

Two large crews of telephone linemen were sent out of Missoula yesterday by District Plant Chief Adams of the Rocky Mountain Bell company. One crew will be detailed on the work of repairing the lines between Missoula and St. Regis, especially that portion which was injured by forest fires this season. West of St. Regis the work is also being pushed by several crews of men. There were about 500 poles to set and many thousand feet of wire to string through the district which was not only damaged but completely burned out. This work is to be completed within the next few weeks. Winter will find it in excellent condition.

The other crew to leave Missoula yesterday went east to assist the men already working upon the new circuit being installed by the company between Missoula and Butte. This last crew will work from Missoula to Drummond, and connect there with the line being strung east from that point.

"We did succeed in starting two more crews to work today," said Mr. Adams last evening, "but it has taken lots of searching to find men this fall. This class of men are scarce and it will keep us jumping to finish the outside improvement work that is planned before cold weather sets in."
