CHARLOS TOWN LOTS SOON TO BE ON SALE

The company will donate building sites to parties who will erect two houses to cost \$1,500 each, a warehouse to cost \$2,000, a store building to cost \$5,000 and a site for a hotel building, application to be made prior to November 1. The company announces that water works and electric lights will be installed.

VEGETABLES

HIGH WINDS CAUSE FLOOD

Mexico City, Oct. 10.—Telegraphic reports reaching here at a late hour tonight state that high winds on the gulf have caused an inundation of the port of Campeche, causing considerable property damage. All railroad traffic with Merida, Yucatan, is suspended. The authorities fear that unsanitary conditions resulting from the receding waters may cause an outbreak of yellow fever. The report states there was no loss of life.

Salina, Kan., Oct. 10.—George Snyder, engineer, and Royal Hinton, fireman, were killed when a Missouri Pacific freight train was wrecked at Salina, near here, today. Snyder was crushed beneath the engine and Hinton was scalded to death.
