The party left Missoula early yesterday afternoon in rigs and expected to reach Potomac for supper and remain there all night.

The speakers for last night's meeting were the same as have been out with the candidates for the past week at other points in the county. Mr. Mulrooney is a candidate to succeed himself as county attorney and Ronald Higgins was nominated for the state legislature. Both have been making excellent speeches at the several meetings already held. Jay McCormick, a Missoula young man well known throughout the county, has simply entered the campaign as a speaker and has made a good impression everywhere he has appeared. The Potomac meeting promises to be one of the best of the week.

This evening the republicans will hold a meeting at Carlton.
