CRANKY SAM GOES AT LAST

LOCALLY FAMOUS CHINAMAN CROSSES THE GREAT DIVIDE, AFTER LONG ILLNESS.

Cranky Sam—nobody knows his ancestral name—an old Mongolian resident of Missoula and a man who has tragically broken every law and ordinance of this city during his residence here, died at his island quarters early yesterday morning from chronic alcoholism. The members of the Chinese colony have the body in charge and announce the funeral under Chinese rites on Wednesday afternoon. Burial will be in the Chinese grounds up the Battlement.

Although Cranky Sam has been regarded as an outcast by the other natives of the Celestial land who reside here, that community refused to permit the county authorities to supervise the funeral arrangements, preferring to accord the body of the dead man a Chinese burial. According to his most intimate friends Sam was something over 60 years of age. During life he conducted a hop joint and was frequently in trouble with the police. He was known to every frequenter of the restricted district as a man who knew no law and respected no person. Some weeks ago he was arrested for trouble he had with a colored woman, and since that time he has not operated his place with any degree of regularity and has made his home with a charitably inclined colored man on the island. If he ever had any relatives no one ever knew of them.
