IRELAND WELCOMES JOHN REDMOND
CHAIRMAN OF PARLIAMENTARY LEAGUE BACK HOME FROM UNITED STATES.
Dublin, Nov. 13.—John E. Redmond, chairman of the Irish Parliamentary league, returning from a tour of the United States, received ovations at Cork and Dublin today. He addressed meetings at both cities. Mr. Redmond protested against the attempts of the O'Brienites to divide the nationalist party. Never in the lifetime of the people, he said, had such an opportunity arisen and he was going to London immediately with the single purpose to exact the best terms possible for Ireland out of the English statesmen. He believed that the struggle would be short and would result in the removal of the only obstacle to Ireland attaining national liberty.
In his progress from Queenstown to Dublin the only place in which Mr. Redmond had a hostile reception was at Malton, the birthplace of William O'Brien. The police protected him until the train proceeded.

DENVER PREPARES FOR 'PLANES
FIRST AVIATION MEET IN MOUNTAINS SCHEDULED FOR THIS WEEK.
Denver, Nov. 13.—Aeroplane for the first aviation meet ever held in America at so great an altitude will arrive here tomorrow morning, according to advices received tonight, and will be set up for tests preliminary to the opening of the meet on Wednesday. Starting results are expected from the meet because of the fact that a scant 4,515-foot flight from Denver's altitude of, roughly, 5,200 feet, will surpass the world's record for height, 9,714 feet. This tempting prospect has allured Ralph Johnstone, Walter Brookings and Arch Hoxsey, all Wright pupils, and negotiations are now on with a number of other aviators. Prizes of \$1,000 for a flight over Denver from Overland park, where the meet will be held, and of \$2,000 for a flight to the foothills already have been posted. In addition, R. E. Harvey, local manager of the meet, announced tonight that additional prizes for a flight to Colorado Springs, 74 miles, and Pueblo, 120 miles, both necessitating high climbs, are contemplated.

ARBITRATION BOARD TO GET BUSY
AMONG HUNDRED CASES FOR BASEBALL TRIBUNAL IS MONTANA-IDAHO LEAGUE.
Chicago, Nov. 13.—One hundred cases are on the calendar for adjudication by the national board of arbitration of the National Association of Professional Leagues, which convenes at the Auditorium hotel tomorrow for the annual meeting of the association. Included in the list are applications for territory for several new leagues and three protests on which the pennant awards in as many leagues depends.
Pennsylvania, in this way, will require territory for the Northern Pennsylvania, which desires to place teams in Lansdale, Quakertown, Olney and Ambler; California will apply for a franchise to embrace San Jose, Stockton, Vallejo and Oakland, and Idaho and Montana will ask permission to establish the Union association, with clubs in Salt Lake City, Boise, Twin Falls, Oakes, Helena, Butte, Great Falls and Missoula.
The board will hear the protest of the Houston club on several games played last season in the Texas league on which the pennant award hinges. It also will thresh out the dispute between Vancouver and Spokane over a game won by Spokane. Upon this decision the pennant in the Northwest league hangs.

RAMPAGE OF SEINE MAKES TROUBLE
PARIS BEGINS TO SUFFER ONCE MORE FROM FLOODS—CONDITIONS BAD.
Paris, Nov. 13.—There has been no abatement in the flood in the River Seine, which continues to rise. The gauge at Pont Royal tonight marks 3.82 meters, which is 3.45 meters above normal, and higher than estimated a few days ago for this date. The river authorities estimated that the rise will continue until Thursday, when it is expected to reach a maximum of 7.20 meters, a little more than two meters under the disastrous floods of last January.
The low quarters at the eastern end of the city and part of the museum of natural history are inundated and the subterranean passages to the Austere station are flooded, gangways being improvised for passengers. The cellars of the Palais de Justice, the Conciergerie and the prefecture of police are full of water.
Tonight rain began to fall. The suburbs are suffering immense damage. The river at Asnières is over its banks, flooding the lower floors of houses. The poor in the eastern suburbs, who were stricken last January, are again suffering almost as severely. Many residents already have moved out their furniture. It is feared that several families will be forced to close tomorrow, throwing thousands out of work. The River Marne is falling, but several of the smaller places along its banks are inundated.
