## FIGHTING FRENCHMAN IN A FURIOUS FRACAS

S. D. Protine and Jerry Durespo were arrested yesterday afternoon on a charge of fighting. Durespo, in his arraignment, demanded the statutory time to plead, and the trial was set for 10 o'clock this morning. The fracas occurred at noon in the West Front street noodle parlor, each man getting a showy cut on the face as his portion of the proceedings. Durespo was arrested early by Detective Pete McDonald, who turned the culprit over to Constable Sam Pulliam. The prisoner played a smart game and slipped from Sam's clutches, but the chief constable later grabbed his man on Higgins avenue. In the police station Durespo, who is a Frenchman, had little difficulty in explaining to the court that Protine was the aggressor and that he merely acted on the defensive. Both men were employed during the summer with a gravel pit gang near Frenchtown, and Protine charges Durespo with having been instrumental in getting him fired from the job.
