MRS. HELEN L. DUM IS DEAD

AGED LADY ANSWERS SUMMONS
AFTER LINGERING FOR
TWO WEEKS.

Helen L. Dum, aged 67, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. F. W. Freeman, 1520 South Fifth street, west, at 9:30 o'clock yesterday morning. Her death was due to congestion of the lungs and followed an illness of just two weeks. Mrs. Dum has been a resident of Montana for the last eight years, coming to the state from Staples, Minn. She came first to Great Falls, where a daughter, Mrs. T. C. McCarthy, resided. Next she went to Glasgow with her daughter's family and thence to Missoula, where she has been for two years. She was born near Elmyra, N. Y., December 24, 1843. With her parents she came to Zumbro Falls, Minn., while a child. Since then she has always lived in the west. She attended the Congregational church. Mrs. Dum was a woman of gracious, whole-souled nature and had many friends. She was most beloved, perhaps, by the children of her neighborhood. To all of them she was "grandmother."

She is survived by one son, William Dum of Staples, Minn., and three daughters—Mrs. Edward Powers of Staples, Mrs. T. C. McCarthy of Glasgow and Mrs. F. W. Freeman of Missoula. All of her children are now here.

The funeral will be held at the Congregational church at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. Rev. E. D. Runtz will officiate. Interment will be in the Missoula cemetery.



PUBLIC LAND SURVEY IN CHOUTEAU COUNTY

T. O. Johnston, a United States transit man who has been in charge of some public surveys for Uncle Sam around Chinook, Chouteau county, stopped here yesterday on his way to visit at the home of his father, O. T. Johnston, who formerly resided on O'Brien creek.

Mr. Johnston says that the lines of about 15 townships have been run out this summer. The work was discontinued on account of cold weather.

"The country through which we were working is not exactly a summer resort right now, and our tents became pretty cold for comfort. Although most of the lands we have been surveying are best adapted to grazing, there are a great many acres which are said to be very suitable for dry farming. At any rate, they are being settled upon very fast. Little cabins and board shacks are springing up everywhere over there, and the country promises to be thickly populated. We will do no more surveying this winter."
