

PROSECUTION LOSES BY A WEDDING

BUTTE MAN MARRIES FORMER WIFE TO AVOID CHARGE IN DISTRICT COURT.

Butte, Nov. 23.—(Special.)—Quite romantic is the second marriage of Carrie Williams and William O'Brien, which resulted in the husband being turned loose from a charge of attempted murder of his wife.

They were married for the first time seven years ago, and had one child. Then they were divorced. The woman married Harry Nace. Their union proved unfortunate, also, and there was another divorce. Recently, while the twice-divorced wife was working as cashier at one of the picture show places, O'Brien returned to town and began to make love to her. She refused to take his word for it. He went to her house one day, loaded with whiskey and a gun, and shot her. She recovered and O'Brien was released on bail.

The two were married very quietly a few days ago. When the case against O'Brien was called today there was no prosecuting witness, as the law cannot make a wife testify against her husband. The action was dismissed.

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RECOUNT DEMANDED BY GREAT FALLS

BOARD OF COMMERCE SENDS TELEGRAM TO DURAND THAT IS FULL OF SNAP.

Great Falls, Nov. 23.—The census commissioner of the board of commerce, in answer to a reply from Census Director Durand, refusing to take a recount here, sent the following telegram to Mr. Durand:

"Denying that the census was correctly taken in Great Falls, we again demand that this city be enumerated in order to prove that it has an actual resident population exceeding 23,000, to counteract the injury that is daily being done Great Falls by the publication by you of the pretended and fraudulent census taken under authority of your bureau and by your enumerators. The school census of this city shows 4,113 children, and the attendance was 1,816 in the year of 1900. The census of 1910 of children under 21 was 6,431, and actually attending school 3,108. Street car traffic has increased 129 per cent, lighting 150 per cent and possibly 105 per cent during the past 10 years. We had the population in 1900, notwithstanding your assertion to the contrary, and we have the population we now claim, and we have the right to be properly and honestly counted."

Mrs. Weigert that orders had been issued by many of the forest rangers to their men to remain with the crew in all events, and that the command had been enforced in many instances at the point of a gun. Forester Greeley said this was quite true in some cases, and the enforcement of this mandate had been the means of preserving the lives of hundreds of firefighters. Whether or not Ranger W. H. Rock was the author of an order of this nature, Mr. Greeley could not say, but Mrs. Weigert is positive in her statement to this effect. Whether or not this is supported by an affidavit, made by a man who was in the Rock squad, has not been made public.

CONVICT FATALLY SHOT BY AN UNIDENTIFIED MAN

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—While he was drinking in a saloon here today, Charles Crosby, a convict, was shot and fatally wounded by an unidentified assailant, who escaped before the police arrived.

In a pocket of the wounded man's clothing was found a jail visiting card made out to James O'Neil, an alias of Charles O'Neil, who was shot and killed Sunday night in an attempt to rob a saloon.

Crosby indicated that he knew his assailant, but declined to make an ante-mortem statement.

MRS. LAURA SCHENCK PLEADS NOT GUILTY

Wheeling, W. Va., Nov. 23.—Declaring that Mrs. Laura Parnsworth Schenck, accused of attempting to murder her husband, John O. Schenck, is illegally deprived of her liberty, and that the special grand jury which indicted her was illegal, made up the tenor of the six special pleas which Mrs. Schenck's attorneys entered before Judge L. S. Gordon today. In addition, Mrs. Schenck entered a formal plea of not guilty to each of the counts of the indictment.

HIGH DIVE IS TAKEN TO COMMIT SUICIDE

Philadelphia, Nov. 23.—Dropping from the 12th-story window of the Land & Trust company skyscraper at Broad and Chestnut streets today, Henry Brewer, 30 years old, met death. He was seen hanging from a window sill by a scrub woman and just as she screamed, Brewer fell. Brewer was a credit adjuster, employed by a firm having offices in the building. The police say there is no doubt Brewer committed suicide.

CONVICTION OF RUEF SUSTAINED BY COURT

San Francisco, Nov. 23.—The district court of appeals of the First district today sustained the conviction of Abraham Ruef, former political boss of this city, charged with having bribed supervisors and denied him a new trial. The decision is contained in 46 pages written by presiding Judge Cooper and affirms the lower court on all points. Ruef had been sentenced to 14 years' imprisonment and was at liberty on bail pending action on his appeal.

Kansas City, Nov. 23.—Monte Attell of California won the bantamweight championship of the world on a decision after 10 rounds with Jimmy Walsh of Boston here tonight.
