

CHAMPIONSHIP GAME TODAY PROMISES SPLENDID BATTLE

The big day has come. At 2 o'clock this afternoon the team wearing the blue and gold of the state agricultural college will battle against Montana's copper, silver and gold in the last and hardest game of the college football season. Both teams are fit for the game and the contest will be one well worth seeing. The university team defends the championship title. Tomorrow Montana has everything to lose and nothing to gain. Win or lose the championship is hers but should McIntosh's men get away with the big end of the score the title will be a mere thing of paper.

As the situation stands at present the farmers have no victories to their credit while Montana has won two games and tied one. The varsity, however, has only met the Aggies once before, the game resulting in a tie. The Bozeman team outplayed Montana at every stage of the game in this contest and it was only by luck that Montana averted defeat. Today the test will come again with the Aggies confident of better luck and Montana sure of victory.

Both teams practiced hard yesterday afternoon. The Aggies arrived shortly after noon and spent an hour in running signals on the university campus. They played fast yesterday and ran splendid interference and the varsity supporters who watched the workout lost a great deal of their confidence. The Aggies have a fast, strong team, and they are going to put up a good game.

So far as weight is concerned the varsity appears to have a little the best of it. According to the figures turned in by Coach McIntosh the farmers average 153 1-17, while Coach Cary's tables show a varsity average of 158 7-11. On the line the difference is not so great, the Aggies averaging 154 4-7 and the varsity 159 2-7. The backfield naturally shows a greater difference. Montana men behind the line averaging 160 1-4 and the Aggies having an average of 149 1-2. The first team men on the university eleven have an average age of 20 9-11 and the Aggies of 20 3-11.

The two teams appear to be about evenly matched. Both are fast and trained to the minute and there should be nothing slow about the game today. The university team has a number of new, fast plays which have been saved especially for the game today and a little bewilderment may be expected when these new formations are sprung on the farmers. With such an overwhelming advantage in the backfield it is probable that Montana's style of play will consist chiefly of line bucking but with Little's punting to help a good deal of open play will be seen.

The men on the two teams will all be numbered and the numbers will be printed in the most souvenir program which the students at the university have printed for the game. With this plan in operation it will be possible for every spectator in the grandstand to pick out both the university and the visiting players and more clearly understand the game.

Last night the university students paraded over the business part of town and a great deal of spirit was aroused. The game today will be the last and the best of the season. The state champions are in excellent form and are playing brilliant ball, while the visitors have a team which they claim is the best in the state. It will be a battle royal and the man who misses it will be sorry. The university has boosted the town by bringing the football championship here. Go to the game and boost the university. The game will start at 2 o'clock and will be over easily by 3:30 so that there will be plenty of time for Thanksgiving day dinners after the contest. Come out and root.
