**SECOND GRAND PRIZE FOR MISSOULA**

**LUMBER AND FUEL ON FLATHEAD**

ACTIVITIES ON FORMER RESERVATION ARE INCREASING—NEW MILLS AT WORK.

That the lumber industry is destined to become an important factor in this section is becoming recognized more and more every day, says a Roman paper. With something like 6,000,000,000 feet of growing commercial timber known to be standing on the outskirts of the reservation, and with hundreds of people seeking homes within its limits, lumber men are commencing to awaken to the greatness of the market and the availability of the lumber and are buying and placing in operation many sawmills to convert the raw product into commercial lumber.

Among those who are now actively engaged in this business is Henry Raymond, Levi Allard and a Mr. Lebleuf, who are already cutting 5,000 feet per day. They have made arrangements with the Langhoff's for the use of their steam engine this winter and with a large force of men will increase the output materially.

This mill will be of easy access to all residents in the vicinity of Roman and this town will take the entire output.

Louis Courville was in town this week and ordered a 10,000-foot capacity mill, to be delivered just as soon as possible. He has arranged with the Wagner Bros. for their steam engine to furnish the power and in a short time expects to be furnishing lumber to all corners. This mill will also be close to the town and its output will be taken by the Roman yards.

**Fire Wood.**

Aside from the lumber industry to be found here is also the fuel question to deal with. Being isolated from a railroad, the freight charges on coal makes the black diamond too much of a luxury, so the people here are compelled to resort entirely to wood for fuel.

Recognizing this fact, Baptiste Maringo and John Valley have purchased a 6-horse power engine and wood saw and will soon have it in operation. They expect to be able to furnish wood, cut to stove length, in any amount.

Phil Innias is another who has purchased a gasoline outfit and will establish a wood yard. His engine will be only 4-horse power, but with this he expects to be able to supply his customers.

Wood for fuel will be a great by-product of the lumber industry, and these power saws will relieve the situation and furnish remunerative employment to a number of men.
