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HAMMOND'S HOME IS ROBBED MANSION IN FRISCO ENTERED BY THIEVES—GET \$2,500 IN JEWELS. The Examiner of San Francisco has the following account of the burglary of the home of A. B. Hammond, formerly of this city. The story appears under the head, "Lumber King's Home on Broadway Robbed," and is as follows: The home of A. B. Hammond, head of the Hammond Lumber company, at 2322 Broadway, was robbed of \$2,500 worth of jewelry and other valuables and never a trace left of how the robbers gained entrance or made their escape. The robbery occurred during the absence of members of the Hammond family. The whole upper floor of the house was ransacked and every article of value taken. Detectives working on the case are mystified by the fact that the thieves left no trail. No one was seen to enter or leave the Broadway home during the night, and there is no indication that the wholesale theft was known to the police as an "inside job."

NOTHING DOING. St. Paul, Dec. 18.—After a 24-hour stay here, 200 strike-breakers bound for Winnipeg, where a street car strike has been declared, departed for points in the east after learning that Canadian immigration officials would not allow them to cross the line. It was claimed that such an entrance would be in violation of the Canadian labor laws. It is said the Canadian officials were advised of the contemplated entry by Chicago labor men.

PRISONERS ESCAPE. Lima, O., Dec. 18.—Four prisoners in the county jail here went their way to freedom this afternoon, after a murderous assault on Sheriff Van Gurten. Standing over his unconscious father, the sheriff's 15-year-old son held the other prisoners at bay until they came. Charles Collins, Spencer Stevens, William Evans and Herman Berger were the men who escaped. Berger and Evans were captured shortly afterwards.

CARD GAME FATAL. Washington, Pa., Dec. 18.—William Love, 76 years old, is dead with half his head blown off. George Broadnax, charged with the shooting, and his wife, held as a witness, are in jail, while a huge danger that was in Love's hand when he was shot, still sticks in the floor of the Broadnax house, where it was forced by the weight of Love's body when he fell. The tragedy was the result of a miners' card game at Marianna, near here.

GALLAGHER DIES. San Francisco, Dec. 18.—Billy Gallagher, a well-known sporting man of this city, who acted as timekeeper at the Hogan-Frayne fight yesterday, died tonight as the result of a bullet wound received last night in a quarrel with Charles Long, a deputy sheriff of San Mateo county. Long shot Gallagher in the stomach. He is under arrest.
