RED CROSS SEALS SELLING READILY

Reports from headquarters of the American Red Cross given out today indicate that at the beginning of the last week of the sales of Christmas seals, nearly 25,000,000 have been sold and that the prospects are bright for a sale of more than 50,000,000.

The national authorities estimate that over 4500,000 will be added to the tuberculosis funds in all parts of the country. This will be double the amount realized last year.

Engaged in this campaign for selling Red Cross seals is an army of over 100,000, including men, women and children of every rank and station. Agents have been appointed in one or more places in every state, except Idaho and Montana. Among the groups and institutions which are assisting in the movement are the Anti-Tuberculosis societies, Red Cross chapters, women's clubs, labor unions, lodges, schools, banks, theaters, department stores, hospitals and innumerable other agencies. Thousands of dollars worth of advertising is being placed in the campaign, and many millions of circulars are being distributed to remind people to buy Red Cross seals.
