## UNIVERSITY'S YEAR IS NOTABLE GREAT FALLS GETS MEETING IS CALLED BY MARTIN CHEAP WAGON

BROAD DEVELOPMENT MARKS 1910 IN THE BIG SCHOOL AT MISSOULA.

The past year has been one of prosperity and advancement to the state university. Great strides have been taken during the 12 months past—strides which mean greater progress for the institution during the coming year. The principal gain was not material—it was the inculcation of a new spirit into the school. Students, alumni and faculty have worked together for the good of the school, and the university has awakened to a realization of the power of its influence. During the summer the school carried on a thorough and successful campaign for new students. During the fall it fought with great success for the tax amendment to the state constitution, and as a result of the two campaigns there is a spirit of unity and consciousness of power among the students of the school which is going to lead them to big things this year.

Last year the university won the championship of the state in a triangular track and field meet with the School of Mines and the Agricultural College. M. S. Buerdick won the state oratorical championship, and this fall the school won again the state football honors.

The faculty has been enlarged and increased during the past year, and is now large enough to handle a complete course in every department. Professor Gustav Fischer, at the head of the department of music, is giving the school a new impetus in musical directions, and the work of every profession in every department has been excellent.

During the year, through the kindness of P. S. Lusk and others, a lot of valuable machinery was donated to the engineering department. Mr. Lusk gave the university \$25,000 worth of electrical tunneling and other machinery, and in addition several valuable gasoline engines and a refrigerating plant, which enables the university to manufacture the ice needed in the dormitory, have been secured.

The state board of education last month sanctioned an appropriation of \$215,000 to the university during the coming two years, an amount which will enable the school to extend the campus and improve the walks and surroundings on the present campus. A men's dormitory was also recommended, and, under the auspices of the alumni association, a campaign is now being carried on among the members of the state legislature with a view to obtaining this building, which is badly needed at present.

The year has been one of accomplishment, and the coming year promises to be even more prosperous. The second semester opens this month, and the university officials expect to see a heavier registration than ever as a starter for the new year.

### PROSPECTORS HURT.

Glenwood Springs, Colo., Jan. 1.—Bert Adams and William Richards, prospectors, were seriously injured by a premature explosion of giant powder at their claim in the Defiance mining district today. The claim is located 15 miles from Glenwood Springs and is reached by an almost impassable trail. Joseph Pease, a partner of the injured men, made his way to Glenwood Springs today and Dr. C. M. Stewart agreed to accompany him to the claim. They expect to reach the injured men tonight.

### CENSUS FIGURES AGAIN PROMISED

In a letter received yesterday by the Missoula Chamber of Commerce from Senator Dixon at Washington, the senator states that he has been advised by census officials that the figures having to do with the population of Missoula and the other towns not yet announced, will be given out early this week. He could give no approximate figures of what the population of the garden city has finally been figured by the census department.

### EXAMINATION DATES FOR EIGHTH GRADE

County Superintendent of Schools Mrs. Pearl T. Marshall last evening announced that January 19 and 20 have been set as the dates for holding the eighth grade examination in the county. This is one of the important examinations of the year, and a large number of students will undoubtedly be on hand to take the tests. The place of holding the examination will be announced later.

BIDS OPENED AT HELENA SHOW ELECTRIC CITY MADE GOOD BUY OF FIRE WAGON.

Great Falls is congratulating itself recently some new auto fire-fighting apparatus was purchased, and now it has learned by the city authorities, according to a story published in the Tribune, that Great Falls paid several hundred dollars less for its machine than the same was offered there recently. The price of auto fire-wagons is interesting in Missoula right now, as this city will purchase in the near future, the bids to be opened by the city council at its next meeting, January 9.

Concerning the difference in price of the Helena and Great Falls machines the story referred to states:

"The members of the fire committee of the city council, the chief of the fire department and others who were instrumental in securing the chemical automobile for the city, are feeling happy over the fact that by purchasing when they did they apparently have saved the city several hundred dollars. They came to the conclusion that the money was saved by comparing the price paid for the Great Falls engine and the figures at which a machine of similar make, but of smaller capacity, has been offered to the Helena council.

"In Great Falls \$6,240 was paid for an 80 horse power machine, carrying two chemical tanks of 35 gallons capacity each, 2,000 feet of hose and other necessary fire-fighting appliances. The offer of the Seagrave company, which sold the machine here, is to supply Helena with an 80 horse power machine, carrying one chemical tank of 35 gallons capacity, hose, etc., for \$4,300. Those best informed on the subject figure that the double chemical tank capacity, and the changes in the machine which this made necessary make the Great Falls machine worth several hundred dollars more than the one offered in Helena.

There are a number of other bids made in Helena, some of them lower, but it is said that these are not the equal of the Seagrave in horse power or otherwise. One bid, from the Knox company, for what is said to be almost an identical machine to that furnished by the Seagrave company, is higher."
