SCRUGGS HOLDS BAILIFF AND LETS BUTLER ESCAPE

Atlanta, Ga., Jan. 10.—Colonel Lindsay Scruggs, formerly minister to Venezuela and Colombia, today tore the coat from Bailiff Spears and held him long enough to permit the negro butler at the Scruggs' house, charged with wife beating, to make his escape. Colonel Scruggs claimed the warrant was more than a year old and out of date and that the bailiff was drinking at the time he presented it. The officer claimed Colonel Scruggs started the trouble by attempting to tear up the warrant. The police have taken no action.

FOREST FIRE SUMMARY.

Wallace, Jan. 10.—(Special).—The summary compiled by the officers of the Coeur d'Alene national forest from the reports of rangers shows that the loss of timber and forage was \$11,500,000. About 250,000,000 feet of timber was burned. The acreage swept by the fires was 555,000. The cost of fighting the fires was \$152,160. Over 2,500 men were employed in fire fighting, the greatest number working at any one time being 1,800, on August 20.

TO CONDEMN STREET RAILWAY.

Seattle, Jan. 10.—The city council passed a bill today submitting to the voters, on March 7, a proposition to issue \$500,000 of bonds for the condemnation of the Seattle, Renton and Southern Street Railway company's property and providing for its operation under municipal ownership.

The Renton road has been engaged in warfare with its patrons in an attempt to collect two fares within a single trip in the city limits.

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COMMANDER LUBY DIES AT SEA

EXPIRES ON BOARD PROTECTED CRUISER DES MOINES, WHICH HE COMMANDED.

Washington, Jan. 10.—Commander John P. Luby of the protected cruiser Des Moines died on board that vessel January 8, in the vicinity of Cape Verde islands. The navy department was advised of Commander Luby's death in a dispatch received today from the executive office of the Des Moines. The department advised did not indicate the cause of death.

The Des Moines is en route home from special service at Liberia. She is now at St. Vincent, Cape Verde islands, and will make the remainder of the voyage with Lieutenant Charles T. Hurt, executive officer, in command. The body of Commander Luby will be taken to Boston, where the vessel is scheduled to arrive about January 21. Commander Luby was born in Ireland July 20, 1858, and was appointed a midshipman in the navy from New York on June 25, 1876. During the Spanish-American war he served as the executive officer of the fleet tender Yankton. He was promoted to the grade of commander in 1897 and was placed in command of the Des Moines last April.

OVERCOME BY GAS.

Wallace, Jan. 10.—(Special).—George Warner and John Roseman, miners employed at the Marsh property near Burke, were overcome by gas from an explosion of dynamite in the mine, and but for the prompt treatment by a physician they might not have recovered. Warner was unconscious for an hour. The two, together with a number of companions, were working in the drift. A round of dynamite was fired at the face of the tunnel, the miners all leaving the vicinity to escape the gas. Warner and Roseman ventured back too soon and were overcome. Suspecting their plight, when the couple did not return immediately, other miners formed a rescue party and went to the aid of their comrades.

CITY SUES COUNTY.

Wallace, Jan. 10.—(Special).—The city attorney has been instructed by the council to bring suit against Shoshone county to collect \$3,640, alleged to be due as the city's proportion of property road taxes for several years past. The county commissioners want to compromise by paying simply the back taxes for 1909 and 1910. The only basis of a compromise favored by the city is the payment of \$2,800, it being estimated that the cost of fighting the case through the courts would cost \$500.
