### FLATHEAD RAILWAY DATA SECURED

MISSOULA MEN ACTIVE IN CONSTRUCTION OF LINE ACROSS THE RESERVATION.

Replying to a question concerning the object of his visit to Missoula after being absent for nearly two years, P. F. Reinhardt, a railroad and ditch contractor, who was engaged in work in this locality during the early days of construction work on the Puget Sound railway, yesterday said he was here to look over the Bitter Root and Flathead country with a view to becoming interested in lines of construction in those districts.

### Talk of Railways.

Yesterday afternoon Mr. Reinhardt met a number of influential business men of Missoula, and together with them he became engrossed in a discussion concerning the prospect of another railway up the Bitter Root valley, and then passed to a consideration of the Missoula end of the proposed Missoula-Kalspell electric line across the Flathead country.

### Through Frenchtown.

Then again, data was produced showing a negotiable route which would give Missoula an electric line across a goodly portion of the Frenchtown and Grass valley country, through Nine Mile and crossing the ridge to Dixon, then skirting the hills following the Jocko river and reaching Jocko by an entrance from the north, thence through the Roman country to that town and then to the foot of the lake.

### A COLD BLAZE.

### ROAD IS BLOCKED. PASSENGERS HUNGRY

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 11.—It is costing the Canadian Pacific railway \$400 a day to feed 500 passengers tied up at Calgary on the way to Vancouver, and no forecast is made as to when the road may be clear. Shovelers have hard work, owing to the severe weather, in their work of clearing the track. On the Crow's Nest line, 12 trains are tied up within six miles of Michel.

### TO SPEND BIG MONEY IN WORK OF LOGGING

Wallace, Jan. 11.—(Special.)—The Milwaukee Lumber company will spend \$300,000 in logging burned timber on Big creek, a tributary of the St. Joe, near Avery, according to a statement made by A. V. Bradrick of St. Mary's in his address before the county commissioners yesterday in opposition to the granting of saloon licenses in the vicinity of the lumber camps. Mr. Bradrick also said that the McGoldrick company and other lumber companies would expend large sums in logging and that their work would be greatly hampered if saloons were allowed to run nearby, since it would then be impossible to retain good men, or be sure that the men at work were clear headed. The commissioners have the arguments of the lumber men and the saloon men under consideration. The saloons asked for would be established at the mouth of Big creek and at Elk Prairie.
