

WHITESIDE'S BILL CAUSES STIR

ACT TO GIVE CONTROL OF LANDS ON NAVIGABLE STREAMS TO STATE BOARD.

Helena, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—The following bill by Senator Whiteside is causing a little storm in certain quarters: "An act entitled 'An act giving control of the lands in the beds of navigable streams and waterways to the state board of land commissioners, for holding the sale of such lands and defining the terms upon which said lands may be leased, forbidding the construction of any navigable streams or waterways and fixing penalties for the violation of this act.' "Be it enacted by the legislative assembly of the state of Montana: "Section 1. The beds of all navigable streams, lakes and other bodies of water, including the land between high water mark and low water mark, together with all other lands belonging to the state shall be under the control and management of the state board of land commissioners.

"Section 4. The charge made by the state for the use of any such land shall be nominal or reasonable, as may seem just to the state board of land commissioners, but any wharf or dock constructed upon land belonging to the state shall be open to the use of the public upon the payment of reasonable charges for the same, the rate of which charges may be fixed by the state board of land commissioners or by any board or officer to which such authority may be delegated by law.

"Section 5. The right of free access to lands belonging to the state, as provided in section 2 of this act, shall not be deemed to grant any right of way or any use of lands in private ownership, but in all cases any such right of way or use shall be acquired as otherwise provided by law.

FOUR ARE ARRESTED FOR KILLING BUFFALO

Plains, Feb. 1.—(Special.)—C. W. Church and three Winburn brothers, all new settlers on the Flathead Reservation, were arrested today by Constable George Wells on the charge of grand larceny. It is alleged they killed three tame buffalo belonging to the Charley Allard herd. The state game warden was investigating the case but Mr. Allard swore to the complaint. The state has seven witnesses and the defendants have a number. The hearing will take place in Justice Bowman's court.

MUCH GOLD COINED MARKET MOVEMENT OF THE DAY

MINTS WERE ACTIVE DURING PAST MONTH—TOTAL TREASURY DEFICIT DECREASES.

Washington, Feb. 1.—In spite of a strong rally in the last six days of the month the treasury closed January with a deficit of \$267,000 in the ordinary, and a total deficit of nearly \$4,900,000, of which fully \$3,000,000 represents Panama canal payments. Practically the same showing was made in January a year ago.

Treasury officials congratulate themselves on the fact that the total deficit to date for the fiscal year is only \$21,000,000 as against \$15,000,000 last year. A drop in receipts to \$52,000,000, as against \$57,000,000 in December, is the prime cause of this month's deficiency. Disbursements were \$52,200,000, a half million less than December's.

Dallas, Texas, Feb. 1.—The southwest is enduring an unprecedented hot wave. Yesterday afternoon the thermometer reached 95 degrees in Fort Worth.

Shipments from Russia and Roumania were reported as being stopped. Just before midday open selling by longs caused a setback but commission buying led to a surprising recovery in the end. May ranged from 96 1/2 to 96 3/4 and closed firm 1/2 cent higher at 96 3/4.	
May corn ran from 49 1/2 @ 50 and 50 1/2 with the close firm at 50c, a net gain of 1/2c.	
High and low points for May oats were 33 1/2 and 35 1/2, with latest transactions 1/2 cent down at 33 1/2 @ 33 3/4.	
Provisions sagged because of selling due to heavy January receipts of hogs. After the final long pork was 15 to 17c under last night, and there was a decline shown of 7 1/2 @ 10c in both lard and ribz.
