## SPOKANE PUTS BAN ON PRIZEFIGHTS

Spokane, Feb. 7.—(Special).—The "boxing bouts," scheduled to be pulled off at the Auditorium theater this evening by Fritz Holland of Spokane and Jerry McCarthy of Butte, have been forbidden by Captain George Miles, who is acting in line with the policy of the chief of police during the absence of the latter.

"There will be no prize fights or boxing exhibitions of any sort at the Auditorium this evening," said Captain Miles. "We were not consulted in the plans of the affair, although it has been freely advertised. No application was made for a permit until today, when I advised the promoters that we could not sanction it."

"We have been granting permits to the athletic club for strictly amateur sparring exhibitions. We cannot allow outsiders to come in here to form clubs and put on matches of this sort."

**WANT PENSION BILL TO PASS**

**VETERANS OF THE CIVIL WAR PETITION SENATORS DIXON AND CARTER.**

Kalspell, Feb. 7.—(Special).—Petitions were tonight mailed to Senators Dixon and Carter, signed by about 100 veterans of the civil war, living at Kalspell, or at the state soldiers' home at Columbia Falls, beseeching both to do their utmost to secure the passage of the Sulloway pension bill. The old soldiers did not wait to be sought out by Captain Hillman, once their commandant at the home, but as soon as it was learned he was at the home with petitions they came hobbling from all parts of the grounds and buildings to place their signatures. Seventy seven signed there and many more were gained from old soldiers in Kalspell. None but the names of veterans was allowed on the bill.

**TO EXAMINE TEETH OF THE ARMY LADS**

Washington, Feb. 7.—Incorporated in the army appropriation bill which passed the senate today was a provision for a dental corps. The provision was offered by Senator Bulkley as an amendment and it was accepted without debate. The amendment provides that the corps shall not exceed one dental surgeon to each 1,000 men; that each shall be a graduate of a medical college and shall not exceed 30 years of age. The pay is that to be of members of the medical corps and members are not to be given rank exceeding that of major.

**TO DEPORT SERVIANS FROM UNITED STATES**

Philadelphia, Feb. 7.—Acting on a decision of Judge McPherson in the United States court, immigration officials are today preparing to deport 11 Servians who arrived in this port bound for Gary, Ind., where they intended to seek work in the steel mills. The immigration officials also decided to deport the Servians on the grounds that they might become public charges. The officials claimed that an investigation of labor conditions at Gary showed that more than a thousand men were out of work at that place.

Counsel for the Servians instituted proceedings for their release, but Judge McPherson, in his decision, upheld the immigration officials.

**HARRY THAW LOSES FIGHT FOR FREEDOM**

Albany, Feb. 7.—Harry A. Thaw's appeal from the decision of the appellate division adverse to his contention that he is being illegally detained in the state hospital for the insane at Matteawan, has been dismissed by the court of appeals. This practically sweeps away his last hope for release.

Mrs. Mary Copley Thaw, in her petition to the court set forth that she believed the health of her son is in constant danger, and sought his release because of the "unprecedented and inhuman treatment of a sane, acquitted man in an institution for the criminal insane."
