

WILSON JURY FAILS TO AGREE

JURORS ARE DIVIDED EQUALLY FOR AND AGAINST PRISONER AND ARE DISCHARGED.

King Wilson, charged with highway robbery and brought all the way from Salt Lake to stand trial, does not yet know what his fate will be, for the jury having charge of said case reported last night that it could not agree upon a verdict and was discharged. County Attorney Mulroney announced immediately that he would try Wilson again during the present term of court. Even the defendant was dissatisfied with the result, as he had hoped to be cleared. Wilson is out on bond.

It was noon yesterday when the Wilson case was given to the jury. Four hours later a demand from the jury room for oranges and cigars showed that the 12 men had settled down for a long argument. Afterward came a request for supper and the jury was fed. Then, just at 9 o'clock the jury reported and asked to be discharged. The jury stood six to six, according to Foreman Logan.

Osborne Steel Cultivators

These cultivators are especially adapted for truck growers and farmers. They are carried in three styles, but by adding certain attachments any one of the cultivators can be converted into a No. 55. The main frames, handles, shanks and shovels are alike in construction on all the cultivators, the only difference being in attachments.

The expanding levers will expand the width of cut from 12 to 25 inches. The shovel shanks are forged from steel and are adjustable. They are strong and bent in such shape that they present the shovel as squarely as possible to the ground whether the frame is closed or expanded.

Each of the cultivators is equipped with five shovels which are reversible, providing in this way two cutting surfaces, so that when one s wears the shovels can be reversed. These shovels are extra thick in the center, a feature which makes them exceptionally strong and provides thickness enough for the holes in the center to be deep and square, giving a large bearing surface for the bolts, which effectually prevent the shovels from ever becoming loose. Being thick in the center and thin on the edges, wear has no effect upon the original shape of the shovels. They will retain a sharp point until completely worn out.

The moldboards are made similar to the moldboard and point of a plow. They are reversible, the same as the shovels, and when one point becomes worn the other can be used. They can be set to throw the soil either toward or away from the plants.
