## AMERICANS CHASED BY REBELS

MANAGERS OF CUDAHY RANCH PURSUED TO BOUNDARY BY STANLEY WILLIAMS.

Calexico, Mexico, April 7.—With bullets flying about them, managers of the Cudahy ranch in an automobile, won a race with rebel cavalry to the international boundary today. The incident was the climax of a marauding expedition started by Stanley Williams, the rebel leader, who has been operating independently of the insurrecto forces at Mexico.

The chase followed the looting of the Cudahy ranch by Williams' men, who were not satisfied with the horses, mules and provisions taken last night. Williams also wanted the costly touring car. The Americans on the ranch learned of Williams' design and started for the American line. The rebel cavalry, in hot pursuit, tried various ways to make short cuts, and twice the mounted rebels were close to the fugitives. Once, when the automobile had to be stopped, having become entangled in barbed wire, the bullets flew thick about the Americans, but none was hit.

In the automobile, which was driven by W. E. Taylor, were Thomas P. Daly, manager of the Cudahy ranch, and three others. It is 15 miles from their ranch to the line. Taylor sent the car flying over rocks and ditches at full speed. He cut the mesquite thickets of the desert, leaped the rail road and at the finish plunged through the boundary fence to the American side. When the line was crossed, Williams and his men were less than a quarter of a mile behind. The raiding band numbered 75 men by actual count, and, following the episode, they straggled into Mexicali despite the declaration of Salinas that they would not be permitted to enter. It is possible that the insurrecto commander had changed his mind regarding Williams and is willing to accept reinforcements to his meager garrison of 20 men, as a battle with the federals appears imminent.

WISCONSIN POLITICIAN CONVICTED OF FORGERY

Milwaukee, Wis., April 7.—William A. Stuart, defeated candidate for the democratic nomination for congress in the Fifth Wisconsin district, last fall, was today found guilty of "uttering a false document" and was sentenced to 18 months in the house of correction. He fainted, falling at the feet of his wife as he was being led from the courtroom.

Stuart was arrested in Cincinnati about two months ago. He is charged with getting \$3300 from Eli Secor by forging the signature of the secretary of a mining company.

## POLICE CHIEF MAY GO FREE

THOMAS STRIPLING, WHO ESCAPED FROM PRISON, RECOMMENDED FOR PAROON.

Atlanta, Ga., April 7.—The Georgia prison commission today recommended to Governor Brown that he grant an unconditional pardon to Thomas Edgar Stripling, former police captain of

Danville, Va., who killed a man in this state 11 years ago and escaped while being taken to the penitentiary. His fate now rests with the governor. Stripling is in jail in Harris county, Ga., where he killed W. J. Cornett for an alleged insult to Stripling's sister.

by the democrats; but they can object to those things which are ordinarily done by common sense. "The spirit of fair dealing from the outset, having been set aside by the democrats, they cannot expect to receive many favors from the minority. I apprehend that the unanimous consent calendar in this congress may not be of much value." In the conference were Representatives Cannon, Payne, Hill, McCall, McKinlay, Currier and others of the regular leaders and Representatives Cooper, Nelson and Lenroot of Wisconsin; Madison, of Kansas, and Good and Haughen, of Iowa, representing the insurgents.

The demand for more committee places was presented to Chairman Underwood yesterday and taken under consideration by the ways and means committee. The refusal to give more places was communicated to Mr. Mann this morning. Mr. Mann announced in making up the committee, the former republican rule would be followed of not appointing to the rules committee any of the ranking members of the more important committees of the house. He also said that none of the minority members of the appropriations committee would be placed on other committees.

"I will swear on anything you please." Enraged, Vitozzi turned on his accuser and cried: "I will curse you down to the seventh generation." "I am sorry for you," rejoined the informer. At this time the priest suddenly changed his tactics and in a voice filled with pathos, said: "No I will not curse you. I remember that I am a priest and must pardon even those who injure me. I wish to take you to my bosom." In the same emotional strain Vitozzi continued with reference to his mother's gray hairs until he was overcome and the proceedings halted.

On the resumption of the trial in the afternoon, Vitozzi continued the recital of his history and glorified his life without stint.

President Bianchi asked if it were true that he was at a banquet given by Camorristas at Castellaniere, where it was said, he removed his gown, danced and sang a vicious song.


