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LORD AND O'HARA ARE INDICTED

FEDERAL COURT CHARGES MEN WITH EMPLOYING AGENTS AS HOMESTEADERS.

Helena, June 17.—(Special.)—On a charge of having conspired to defraud the government of tracts of land above the Lolo fork of the Bitter Root river, Harrison S. Lord and Robert A. O'Hara of Hamilton were arraigned in the federal court today. Other persons were indicted with them, but until they are arrested, their identity will not be divulged. Wallace, Brown & Gaines of this city have been retained, and will fight the case on technical grounds. Time was asked in which to plead, which was granted. It is understood that special pleas and demurrer. The two defendants were released on bail bonds of \$2,500 each. The indictment is 25 pages long and charges 55 overt acts on the part of the defendants.
 They are charged with having induced and hired 20 persons to file on certain lands above the Lolo fork of the Bitter Root river, and that the entrymen were acting in the premises as agents and employees of said defendants, it being a part of the design of

said defendants to pay, besides the wages and rewards aforesaid, the precise amount whereof is to the said grand jurors unknown, "all expenses incurred by such settlers in connection with their settling upon and improving said land, with their subsistence while in said employment, with the making of their several entries at said land office, and with causing the issuance of patents for such lands, as well as in connection with the conveying and assigning of their titles and rights to said corporations; and it also being a part of the design of said defendants to require said corporations, after so acquiring such titles and rights from the United States through such persons, to sell and dispose of such lands, titles and rights to persons who would have no knowledge of the manner in which they were acquired by said corporation and thereby to prevent the United States from recovering the same by suit."
 Lord is charged in the indictment with having hired the 20 settlers to settle upon and acquire the title to the 20 several tracts, O'Hara is charged with having drawn up the mortgages conveying the lands to the Citizens' State bank at Hamilton to secure the payment of sums ranging from \$250 to \$500.
 Lord is also charged with having drawn his personal check to the settlers in divers sums in payment of wages and the reward given the settlers for entering upon the lands. O'Hara is also charged, as vice president of the Citizens' State bank, with having executed upon the margin of

the record of the mortgages, written releases.
 The persons named in the indictments as having been induced to enter on the lands are: John Boehme, Mark Hall, Clyde Woodard, Elizabeth Morrison, Leo W. Cottrell, Ivin Woodard, John E. Withers, Edward Erchman, Ida T. Smith, Nat W. Smith, William B. Allison, Charles Tallent.

WOMAN TO TESTIFY FOR HENWOOD

MRS. SPRINGER OF DENVER MUST TELL WHAT SHE KNOWS OF THE LATE TRAGEDY.

Denver, June 17.—John W. Springer, president of the Continental Trust company of this city, and his wife, Isabelle Patterson Springer, against whom Springer commenced action for divorce as a result of the finding of letters from Mrs. Springer in the effects of St. Louis (Tony) Von Phul, who was shot and killed in a hotel here May 24, by Frank H. Henwood, will appear as witnesses for the defense when Henwood is brought to trial in the district court here next Monday. Mrs. Springer has attained much notoriety since the killing as "the woman in the case."
 A subpoena was served on Mrs. Springer today. Another was issued for Springer, but has not yet been served. Both were issued at the instance of Henwood's attorneys.

MEAT IN STORAGE IS ALL RIGHT

EXPERT SAYS BACTERIA WILL NOT ATTACK WHEN TEMPERATURE REMAINS LOW.

Washington, June 17.—The senate committee on manufactures today concluded its hearing of the Chicago packers on their proposed additions to the pure food law affecting cold storage. After hearing the New York fish men next Thursday, the hearings for the present session will be suspended.
 At the meeting today Chemist Richardson of Armour & Co., told the committee that he knew of no case of deterioration in meat thoroughly frozen, but said that bacteria were liable to attack any fresh meat kept at a temperature above 15 degrees. He was confident that properly frozen meat could be preserved for at least six years.
A BAD STORM.
 Salina, Kan., June 17.—With the restoration of telephone communication today came reports of increased damage as a result of the storm which swept this section of the state last night. One death was reported.

FATHER DE SIERE IS HONORED

BUTTE PRIEST IS MADE DOMESTIC PRELATE, WITH TITLE OF "MONSEIGNOR."

Butte, June 17.—(Special.)—Rev. Father Peter De Siere of St. Patrick's parish in this city today was appointed domestic prelate by Pope Pius and will be known by the title of "Monseigneur." The ceremony of investing Father De Siere with his robes of office will be postponed until the arrival of Bishop Carroll, who is expected home from Rome August 1. The ceremony is simple, but impressive and is sure to be largely attended, for it is the first time in the state of Montana that it has taken place.
 The creation of a domestic prelate is very rare. In the whole northwest there are now but six, Father De Siere being the latest, and each of the others is the vicar general of his respective diocese. Helena has the unique record of having two, Monsignor Victor Day and Monsignor De Siere.
