CAUGHT ON THE RUN ABOUT TOWN
Harold Blake was in town yesterday for a short time from Anaconda, where he is now connected with the engineering department of the copper company. It is always home for Mr. Blake when he comes to Missoula and there is always a glad hand reached out to him when he comes up here. Yesterday he had pleasant things to say about the way Missoula is moving along and he found so many people who wanted to talk to him that he had a hard time to get his business done. To the Man About Town, Mr. Blake said, in the course of a talk: "There is much interest in Anaconda and Deer Lodge county in the good-roads meeting that is to be held in Missoula next week. There will be a delegation of from 25 to 30 in attendance from the copper town and they will all be good-roads men. They are much in earnest in this matter and all of them are eager to come. I learn, too, that there is a great deal of attention being given the meeting by the eastern Montana people and I look for a large attendance from that part of the state, so that I am sure your meeting of the congress will be a success. There is much to be learned in Montana about roads and these annual meetings will help a great deal."

Another Anacondan in town yesterday was A. M. Walker, who is one of the men of the state who have always had confidence in the Bitter Root and who has backed his confidence with his money. Mr. Walker was on his way to Hamilton, where he has orchard interests. "This part of the country looks fine," said Mr. Walker yesterday afternoon to the Man About Town. "I have never seen it look better around Missoula than it does now and I hear that the whole valley is fine. I'm going up to see. Missoula itself looks good, but I shall be glad when you get along with your improvement work enough that you can get your streets settled. That is the one thing you need now more than anything else. Every time I come here I can see that you have grown some and your new work looks fine."

The school board has undertaken an extensive campaign for the improvement of the city school property this summer and there is to be a thorough overhauling of the buildings. Improvements are to be made in the ground, as well, and the start has been made at the Roosevelt and Lowell schools in fine shape. At the Roosevelt school, the front and side yards have been transformed into a beautiful lawn which is getting a good start and which will give the building the setting which it needs. The building will now be an ornament to the handsome street upon which it is located. At the Lowell school, too, a fine lawn has been started and is growing well. The portion of the grounds at the Lowell which is to be used for play has been rolled and rolled again until the children have a race course. At the other buildings there is to be general development and work on upkeep which will put the entire property of the district into fine condition for the fall. Superintendent Williams yesterday completed a detailed list of the improvements which are planned. It is lengthy, but its items are all good.

There is more stealing of flowers from lawns and gardens this year than usual. Always there is a gang of sneak thieves operating at this time of year but this month the depredations of these marauders are bolder and more damaging than ever. There have been lots of roses and peonies stolen this week and the theft of the flowers is not the most serious damage done; the thieves are ruthless and they trample and tear more than they take. A shotgun with a load of rock salt would be good medicine for these fellows and there would be little sympathy for them if they were well peppered with this dose. Register Shull of the United States land office is one of the latest sufferers. "Tell those fellows," said he to the Man About Town, "that there will probably be more roses open in 10 days. They took all the roses there were, but I'll try to have the rest open by that time. If you don't know how to reach them, just put a notice in the paper and maybe they'll see it, though I believe they're too mean to read the paper."

DIES AT HOSPITAL.
John Siminon, a Roumanian about 55 years of age, died yesterday morning at 5 o'clock after a lingering illness of nearly six months in St. Patrick's hospital. No trace of relatives has yet been found, but the deceased is supposed to have a brother somewhere in the northwest. Burial arrangements are being delayed while further attempt is made to locate friends or relatives.

ELY AND HIS BIRD HERE MONDAY

BIPLANE TO BE TAKEN TO AVIATION GROUND AND PREPARED FOR THE FLIGHT.

Eugene Ely who is to fly at Missoula next Wednesday, near Fort Missoula, will have his aeroplane here next Monday, and the mechanics will start to set it up immediately. Wednesday Ely made several decidedly successful flights at Kalspell to a crowd of 5,000. If Kalspell can run out such a crowd, Missoula, with twice as large a territory to draw from, will certainly have the banner crowd of the year. Both railroads have notified their different agents along the line advising them to advertise the matter thoroughly in their section and tack up the large posters prepared by the chamber of commerce. Reports from Darby, Hamilton, Stevensville and Victor, and all points in the Bitter Root indicate that 10 extra coaches will be required on the Bitter Root train that morning, especially after it is known that a special will leave that night at 8 o'clock for the return trip as far as Darby, Frenchtown, Bonner, Ovando, Plains and all the towns east and west will be well represented. The fact that the admission price has been cut in two and is only 50 cents will help to swell the crowd wonderfully. An enclosed stretch will be used, and the grounds will be properly patrolled and policed.

The Curtiss Aeroplane.
The war and navy departments at Washington, recognizing the development made by Mr. Curtiss in producing a practical aeroplane, especially for military and naval purposes, have given unusual recognition to the Curtiss aeroplane. The army has purchased the latest type of the Curtiss machine, and both branches of the service detailed officers to the Curtiss aviation school at San Diego, Cal.

Five officers were sent for instruction in aviation under Mr. Curtiss, three from the army and two from the navy. These were: Lieutenant Theodore G. Ellyson and Ensign Charles F. Postland of the navy, and Lieutenant Paul W. Beck, signal corps; Lieutenant J. C. Walker, Jr.; Eighth regiment, and Lieutenant G. E. M. Kelly, Thirtieth regiment, U. S. Infantry.

The three army officers named were ordered to San Antonio, Tex., where the divisional "maneuvers" are under way, and where the new Curtiss military aeroplane was sent for their immediate use. The two navy officers remained at the San Diego camp to carry on a number of experiments with the new Curtiss hydro-aeroplane, which has been developed by Mr. Curtiss with a view to its utility in the navy. This machine flies from or lands upon either land or water, and is conceded the most important step taken in aviation in the past two years.
