SON TELLS LORIMER COMMITTEE THAT HE BELIEVES FATHER'S CONFESSION.

Washington, July 27.—Expressing his firm conviction that his father, former State Senator D. W. Holstlaw, received \$2,500 from a man who offered to pay him that sum to vote for Lorimer for the United States senate, Herschel D. Holstlaw of Lulu, Ill., today appeared before the senate Lorimer committee and substantiated his father's famous "confession."

Deposit Slips Juggled. In cross-examination, Attorney Haney, representing Senator Lorimer, said the deposit slips had been juggled, both at the present and at the former Lorimer investigation.

Thomas Maguire, of a Chicago detective agency, told of working on the so-called White confession. He was explaining the extent of his work when the committee adjourned for the day.

Towney is Cleared. Former Representative James A. Towney of Minnesota was today cleared from any criticism growing out of the testimony of James Keeley that George Glavis had told him Mr. Towney was mixed up in an alleged magazine lobbying matter.

Chairman Dillingham read a telegraphic emphatic denial from Mr. Towney and said as the committee considered there was no testimony before it in any way implicating Mr. Towney, it would not ask him to appear before it as a witness.

SHOOTING RESULTS CHILD IN DEATH

FRANK X. FOX OF WALLACE SUC-CUMBS TO WOUNDS INFLICTED BY JOHN DILLON.

Wallace, July 27.—(Special.)—Frank X. Fox, victim of the shooting affray at the Stewart mine Monday afternoon, died yesterday in the Providence hospital here a few minutes after midnight. According to the attending physician, death was due directly to shock and infection resulting from the injuries to the right leg, the bone of which was shattered by three bullets fired at close range.

As soon as he learned of the death of Fox, County Attorney Wayne filed a complaint charging John Dillon, the supposed demagogue man who fired the shots, with first degree murder. Dillon refused to talk this morning when informed of Fox's death.

CHILD IS RESTORED TO MOTHER

WOMEN JUDGES IN TACOMA REFUSE TO ALLOW DECREE OF DIVORCE.

Tacoma, Wash., July 27.—"Give the child back to its mother" was the decision today of three women judges who advised with Superior Judge Easterday in the divorce case of Mollie Trospier against Harper P. Trospier, but neither the wife or husband, whose fight for their 19-months-old baby has won much prominence, was granted a legal separation. The four judges were unanimous in the opinion that the troubles could be reconciled.

MARLOWE IS FREED BY JURY

PROMINENT WALLACE ATTORNEY IS ACQUITTED OF CHARGE OF BOOTLEGGING.

Wallace, July 27.—(Special.)—George E. Marlowe, prominent local attorney, politician and mining man, was acquitted of the charge of bootlegging, in the probate court here yesterday. The jury found that while Marlowe had disposed of liquor in the St. Joe "dry" precinct, he derived no profit from the transaction.

Marlowe, who only missed being elected prosecuting attorney last fall by the narrow margin of 17 votes, owns and operates a store on the proposed millsite of the Milwaukee Lumber company, near St. Joe. It was while conducting his store, personally, that he was accused of selling intoxicants.

Marlowe's defense, that the lumber company was trying to railroad him out of the camp, was accepted by the jury.

FOREST FIRES RAGE IN IDAHO

SEVERAL SERIOUS CONFLAGRATIONS ARE REPORTED FROM THAT STATE.

Spokane, July 27.—A serious forest fire is reported near Nelson in northern Idaho, defying the efforts of a crew of 34 men to subdue it. It has been burning for 48 hours and two lumber camps are said to be threatened.

Another forest fire has been raging in Bonner county, Idaho, near Sandpoint, and several hundred acres have been burned over. Late tonight, however, this fire was reported under control.

EXPULSED FROM GERMANY.

Berlin, July 27.—M. Yvetol, the French anti-militarist agitator who at a Franco-German socialist meeting on Monday delivered a flaming speech on the possibility of the armies of France and Germany turning against the governments instead of fighting each other in the event of war, was today expelled from Germany.
