RESOLUTION NO. 111-A. A Resolution Creating a Special Improvement District No. 10 in the City of Missoula, Montana, for the Purpose of Building and Constructing Cement Sidewalks, Crabs, Culverts and Street and Alley Crossings, Making and Planting Trees, Parking and Planting Trees, and Grading and Boulevarding the Whole of Brooks Street from South Higgins Avenue to the Southern Boundary of the City Limits.

Whereas, it is the intention of the council of the city of Missoula, Montana, to create a special improvement district in said city for the purpose of building and constructing cement sidewalks, culverts and street and alley crossings, making and planting trees, parking and planting trees, and grading and boulevarding, and changing fire hydrants where necessary, and for the purpose of making other improvements hereinafter set forth and described, upon and along the whole of Brooks street from South Higgins avenue to the southern boundary line of the city limits, the payments of assessments for which are to be made by installment, and are to extend over a period of eight years, and the cost of which special improvements less any amount which may be payable by any person or corporation occupying any part of the street under franchise, warrant, special privilege, district hereby created, including the cost of street and alley intersections, shall be paid by the entire district, each lot or parcel of land within the district to be assessed for that part of the whole cost which its area bears to the whole area of the entire district, exclusive of streets, alleys and public places; and

Whereas, An approximate estimate of the cost of the improvements herein set forth has been made, and is hereby declared to be as follows: \$84,000 in depth, and a total cost of \$170,014.00; and

That the character of the improvements which are to be made in said special improvement district are as follows, to-wit: To grade all that portion of Brooks street from South Higgins avenue to the southern boundary line of the city limits, 60 feet in width between curbs; to build and construct concrete cement curbs immediately adjoining said roadway, and on each side thereof, said curbs to be placed 19 1/2 feet from the property line, the 19 1/2 feet between said curbs and the property line on each side of said street to be divided and utilized as follows: A strip two feet in width adjacent to the property line, and also a strip 12 1/2 feet in width arranged for grass, the trees to be planted in a row along the center line of the strip adjacent to the curb, spaced 30 feet apart; cement sidewalks five feet in width to be built on each side of said street between strips of parking; cement street crossings and alley crossings and culverts to be built across intersecting streets and alleys; fire hydrants to be changed from present locations where necessary, and to be arranged for grass to be placed at all necessary points.

That said improvements contemplated at the present time are to be confined to the following part of the district; the whole of Brooks street between South Higgins avenue to the southern boundary line of the city limits, including all street and alley intersections, and between the north-easterly and southwesterly lines of said Brooks street; and further, be it resolved, That on the 16th day of August, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m. of said day, and the same is hereby designated as the time, and the council chamber in the city hall in the city of Missoula, Montana, as the place when and where the owners or agents of the property to be improved, and who are interested in the same, shall be heard in person or by proxy, and shall have the opportunity to be heard and to present objections or protests to the creation of said special improvement district, or to the making of said improvements, and to the final adoption of this resolution; and further, be it
