## KAFFIRS OUTPLAYED SAINTS IN LAST SERIES

EXCEL AT BAT, IN STOLEN BASES AND IN SACRIFICE HITTING, AND THEN LOSE.

## ORLET LEADS IN BATTING

Each Team Has Four Men Above .300 Mark With the Stick—"Red Dog" Devereaux Follows Orlet—The Weekly Statistics.

Except by the narrow margin of four points in fielding, the Missoula team outplayed Salt Lake in every department of the game in last week's series. The locals excelled at the bat, in stolen bases and in sacrifice hitting, as well as in hits for extra bases. Orlet, by his magnificent work at the bat on Saturday and Sunday, leads the field, with a mark of .533. ## PINCHHITTER DELL BEATS OLD MATES ONCE MORE

FORMER PRIDE OF HAMILTON BRINGS IN THE TIEING RUN IN THE NINTH.

## B. & M. TAKES ANOTHER

Weiser, Sent in to Bat for O'Kelly, With Two Down and Austin on First, Gets Clean Single and Run Comes in—Sad Details.

Hamilton, Aug. 14.—(Special.)—As a pinchhitter, with the score 2 to 1 against his team, "Weiser" Dell made good here today. "Foxy" Schlis ejected the lengthy twirler into the game to bat for O'Kelly in the ninth inning with two down and Austin on first. On the first ball pitched he slammed into right field for a clean single, putting Austin on third. Marx then let one of Gebeau's low ones through and Austin led the score by registering. Dell going to second. Gebeau then hit Schmidt. Harvey rolled a hard one to Snyder which he trapped with his bare hand, but Gebeau let the throw to first get away as he took it on the run. By this time Pinchhitter "Weiser" scampered home, leaving the score of 3 to 2, with Butte holding the big end. Hamilton made a rally in its half of the ninth, starting off with a roar which soon subsided to a suppressed whisper.

Marx led off with a double to right. Raftery put him on third with a neat bunt along the third-base line. Nalle and Gray then put a crimp in all prospects for the tying run, the former grounding to third and the latter popping to Danahy.

Today's game was one of the best ever played on the home grounds. It was filled with sensational fielding by the locals, Nalle leading with three circus stops at third, getting his man ball hard and often, disposing of McLaughlin in three innings, seven hits to the slab then and while he was hit hard he managed to keep Hammond's men away from the plate. The locals lost a chance to score in the fifth. McQuaid and Hammond both singled and with Williams at bat attempted the double steal to put McQuaid over, but "Foxy" Schlis was on the job and fooled with Eddie just long enough to catch McQuaid off third; that made the third out.

Gebeau pitched a fine game today, allowing the visitors but seven hits. He had splendid control, not giving a pass. His work was of the kind that merits a victory and with the stick Williams then scored "Cep" with a line drive to the fence. In the third, Gebeau poled out a safe one, was sacrificed to second by McQuaid and scored on Hammond's single. Williams then singled to left, but Hammond was forced at the plate. Butte scored his first run in the sixth with one lone hit. Merkle singled but was forced at second by Kinville. Kinville then romped home when Tucker laid the ball against the ground behind Hammond.
