BUNKER HILL'S MILL TO HANDLE MUCH ORE

Kellogg, Sept. 30.—(Special).—With the new west mill completed and in operation, the Bunker Hill & Sullivan will be able to handle 1,600 tons of ore a day, according to F. W. Bradley, president of the company.

"We do not expect to have all of the machinery installed in the new mill before the first of the year. When it is ready to run, the old mill will be closed down for a short time, to make some repairs that have long been needed, and to bring it up to date, so that we may keep pace with the constantly-improving methods of handling ore. It will be remodeled and thoroughly overhauled."

The company will at once install the new electric hoist, which arrived this week from the east. A fireproof change house, with all modern improvements, will be built next month.
