FOUR KILLED.

New York, Oct. 9.—Four men were killed and six others injured today in an explosion of dynamite 60 feet underground in a shaft near Central park, where they were working on the aqueduct for the Catskill water system.

The dead men were all Italian laborers. Michael Kearney, foreman of the gang, who was seriously injured, and John W. Martin, night superintendent, were arrested on charges of criminal negligence.

HUSBAND KILLS TWO.

Chicago, Oct. 9.—John Tomaschok followed his wife to the home of a friend, Peter Gralak, today, and instantly killed her and Gralak and mortally wounded his own two-year-old daughter, who had gone with his wife. Then he quietly waited for the police to arrest him. Mr. and Mrs. Tomaschok quarreled yesterday and early today she left him with the child. Her husband followed to Gralak's home and began firing as soon as he entered the house.

A BAS THE MOSQUITO.

Orange, N. J., Oct. 9.—Governor Woodrow Wilson will be asked by the citizens of Orange to send a message to the legislature on the subject of New Jersey's peculiar affliction, the mosquito, and to recommend that a commission be created with powers and means ample to wage a war against the pest. The mosquitoes during the last summer have been the worst in Orange in years.

SAVED THE EGGS, ANYHOW.

Los Angeles, Cal., Oct. 9.—Although eggs that J. P. Shelton, 73 years old, carried when he collided with an automobile are unbroken, Shelton is in a local hospital today suffering from injuries that are expected to result in his death. Shelton ran into the machine while trying to board a street car. His jaw was fractured in two places and his right hip broken. He was clinging to the eggs when picked up.

COURT UPHOLDS ACT.

San Francisco, Oct. 9.—A final decision upholding the McEnergy act, by which land titles may be established without naming the possible claimants, was handed down today by Judge W. W. Morrow in the United States circuit court of appeals. The act was passed as an emergency measure following the destruction of the county records in the fire of 1906.
