WALLACE APPEALS THE CARTER CASE

Judge Small yesterday pronounced sentence on Thomas Carter, who was found guilty by the jury of living illegally with Mrs. Willis. The jury recommended that his sentence be fixed at 100 days in jail and this was the penalty prescribed by Judge Small.

Attorney Wallace immediately gave notice of appeal. Carter's bond was fixed at \$50. C. E. Willis, husband of the woman, has the children in his custody, as he brought an order from the court in British Columbia authorizing him to take them from the woman.
