

# JURY TO TRY JAMES B. McNAMARA HOPED FOR BY NEXT CHRISTMAS

Los Angeles, Nov. 8.—Three sworn jurors and a foreman passed for cause was the showing in the McNamara murder trial tonight at the end of five weeks of court. Another foreman had been accepted by the defense as to cause, and counsel began hoping for a jury box by Christmas to try James B. McNamara for the alleged murder of Charles J. Haggerty, a machinist killed in the Los Angeles Times explosion a year ago. Another venire of 40 men has been summoned, making 285 men thus far drawn for jury service. The men in the jury room tonight were:

Robert F. Bain, carpenter; F. D. Green, orange grower; Byron Lisk, millman, all sworn jurors.

Brewster C. Kenyon, interested in investments, accepted as to cause by both sides.

J. B. Sexton, accepted as to cause by the defense.

John S. Roafem, N. M. Bryte, Clark McLain, Henry G. Burbank, Charles Roth, Beverly Crockett and Howard E. Sweeting, all to be examined.

Of the five foremen accepted by both sides when court opened today, two were excused by Judge Bordwell with the consent of counsel. Sam Mendenhall, an orange grower, was allowed to go because his mother is dangerously ill, and Walter N. Clark, a retired farmer, was excused because of physical condition, which made it doubtful if he could withstand a long trial. Byron Lisk, now a juror, sought release because he has troubles with his eyes, but he was retained.

Harry Chandler, son-in-law of General Harrison Gray Otis, publisher of the Times, who was on the present venire, was excused by consent of counsel it was stated tonight.

## MYERS OF MONTANA PYTHIAN SISTERS ON ELECTION ORGANIZE

**JUNIOR SENATOR THINKS FOSS AND HARMON INCREASED PRESIDENTIAL CHANCES.**

**NEW LODGE IS INSTITUTED AT KELLOGG BY THE IDAHO GRAND CHIEF.**

Washington, Nov. 8.—(Special.)—Senator Myers gave the following interview tonight: "I do not see that there's much to crow over in the result of the elections for either democrats or republicans. The result seems to be about a standoff. The socialists seem to be the only party that can claim much encouragement from the result. Its gains are phenomenal. I think local conditions, in-party contentions and minor issues are largely accountable for the results. The only instance where national issues were distinctly involved, it seems to me, were those of Massachusetts and Kentucky. In Massachusetts, Governor Foss, an ardent tariff reformer, made a tariff-reform fight and was fought by the protectionists, and he won. In Kentucky, a United States senatorship was at stake and the democrats won. One result, I think, will be to boost the presidential chances of Governor Harmon and Governor Foss. The Ohio result, I think, is a setback to President Taft."

While this specific instance is trivial, it served today to bring out intimations that funds collected by Free Masons had not been forwarded to China. Tong strenuously denied this. He would not reveal the names of the banks through which the transfers were made, but insisted that the thousands of dollars collected had been sent.

Tong declared that reports of the fusion of the Young China association and the Free Masons as arranged for by Dr. Sun Yat Sen when the Chinese revolution began to assume serious proportions were untrue. Rumors to the contrary, he ascribed to "traitors within our own ranks."

of the identification made by Miss Noble and would ask what steps the consul would take.

Speaking of the indelible, Coroner Feinberg said:

"I think there are strong grounds for believing that the body is that of Lord Sholto Douglas. But I would not care to say positively that it is without further corroboration."

The complexity of the situation was augmented by the appearance of Charles Ulrich, a newspaper man, at the undertaking establishment last night to further identify the body. He said he was positive he had met the man now dead in Oakland, Cal., in 1901, when he was playing in a stock company and was known as Maurice Stuart. Ulrich said he had never heard anyone speak of him as Lord Sholto Douglas.

## NO SURRENDER.

Tien Tsin, Nov. 8.—The viceroy has declined to surrender Tien Tsin to the revolutionists. He met the leading sympathizers with the revolutionary movement tonight and after an amicable discussion of the question, announced that Tien Tsin would not surrender. As the people desire to avoid a conflict they may defer taking over the government until the situation reaches a more mature stage, knowing the viceroy will be unable to withstand their demands for any length of time.

Details of the murder of General Wu Lu Cheng at the military encampment at Shikia-Chuang have been brought in. The Manchou troops suspected General Wu of co-operating with General Tchang Shao Tseng, in command of the Lang Chao troops in a plan to attack Peking from the north and south simultaneously.

The camp at Shikia-Chuang was searched at the dead of night by a fusillade of Chinese rushing to the general's camp found his headless body in the roadway and documents scattered broadcast.

## CHILDSBERRY DENIES.

Chicago, Nov. 8.—The Marquis of Childsberry today emphatically denied that the man who committed suicide at the Hotel Astor after registering as Maurice Stuart, was his brother, Lord Sholto Douglas. He says Lord Douglas is in the far west and that he received a letter from him two days ago in which the writer declared he was well.

A telegram addressed to the Marquis of Childsberry and signed Sholto Douglas was received here October 23, from Seattle, Wash. Childsberry refused today to divulge the address of Lord Douglas, saying the latter was engaged in mine location work in the far northwest. Further than to say Lord Douglas reported himself well in a letter of several days ago, the Marquis kept secret the contents of the message.

Foulkes, assistant postmaster of Cordova, was arrested yesterday on the steamship Alameda en route to Seattle, charged with the embezzlement of \$4,000 of postoffice funds.
