GEORGE LAFORGE SHOOTS NICK CALL IN AN ATTEMPT TO KILL CHARLES LOSKI.

As the result of a shot in the dark, Nick Call, a Polander, lies in St. Patrick's hospital with a bullet in the lower part of his right chest. The shooting occurred in Thibodeau's saloon at St. Regis about 10 o'clock Monday evening. Charles Loski is the man who was the cause of the disturbance, and the bullet which struck Call was intended for Loski.

Call was brought to the city on freight train, extra 1638, and taken to the hospital upon his arrival in the city. Charles Loski was arrested at St. Regis last evening and Deputy Sheriff Johnson left immediately for St. Regis to bring him to Missoula. It was stated at the hospital that Call has a good chance for recovery.
