GREAT WHITE FATHER IS QUEST OF INDIANS

Spokane, Nov. 30.—Headed by Chief No Shirt of the Walla Wallas and conveyed by State Representative Harvey H. Phipps, 14 of the wealthiest representatives of the Indian tribes of the northwest, left Spokane tonight in a special car for Washington, D. C. There they will press claims said to be long due, demand constructive Indian legislation from congress and with representatives of eastern firms will endeavor to further the advancement of their race. The Indians who left Spokane today represent the Walla Walla-Umatillas, Cayuses, Nez Perces and the six tribes of the Yakimas. Delegates from the Yanktons and Santees will go from South Dakota.
