PENN MAKES GOOD STOCKYARDS' IDOL CORNELL DOPE GETS DECISION 21 TO 9 IN FRISCO

ANNUAL CONTEST AT PHILADELPHIA GOES THE USUAL WAY THIS YEAR.

HARD BATTLE AT FIRST LACKS KNOCKOUT PUNCH

These Eleven Starts Out by Playing Opponents to a Draw in First Period, but Glass Tells and Home Guard Wins.

Philadelphia, Nov. 30.—Pennsylvania, as usual, won the Thanksgiving day football game from Cornell this afternoon, the score this year being 21 to 9. The two teams have met on this day for the last 19 years and Pennsylvania has won 17 times. Ten years ago Cornell won and five years later the teams played a tie. About 25,000 persons saw the contest today.

At the end of the first period it looked like a close game with the result very much in doubt. Pennsylvania had scored in the first three minutes of play and Cornell, before the period ended, evened up the score. The three team then took a brace and played good football, but the locals displayed better generalship, taking the lead in the third period and increasing it in the last quarter.

The game was good in spots and was exciting from the spectators' view. There were numerous forward passes in which Pennsylvania fared better than Cornell. Many end runs from 20 to 30 yards featured the game. Captain Mercer of Pennsylvania being the particular star in advancing the ball.

Pennsylvania stowed the game away safely in the final inning, when nine points were added to her total. The red and blue, securing the ball on a fumble of the punt on Cornell's 10-yard line. The Marshall, who had but a moment before come into the game, kicked a field goal from the 20-yard line. Just as time was about to be called for the end of the game, Barr made an outside kick with the ball well in Cornell's territory and Spruance leaped in the air and caught it. There was no one in front of him and he ran the 10 yards between himself and Cornell's goal for Pennsylvania's final score. Minds kicked the goal. Final: Pennsylvania, 21; Cornell, 9.
