COUNCIL DISCUSSES SEWER QUESTION

MEETING WILL BE CALLED TO CONSIDER SOUTH-SIDE CONSTRUCTION.

The sewer question took up the greater part of yesterday's session of the city council. Sewer Engineer Swearingen was present at the meeting and reported that the storm sewers had practically been completed, and that as soon as a few odds and ends had been finished, the work would be turned over to the city. Mr. Swearingen has laid off his inspectors and thereby reduced his force one-half. His office is now busy completing the final estimate on the storm sewers. As soon as this has been approved by the council, the work will have been finished officially and the Kennedy Construction company will move its remaining outfits to Spokane, where it has contracts for work. Mayor Evans announced that he would call a meeting on December 7 at 8 o'clock of the south-side property holders. The object of the gathering is to discuss sewers on the south side. A great deal of opinion has been expressed for and against sewers on the south side and the council would like to get the sentiment of the residents in that district before proceeding further with the work. The meeting will be held in Reitz's building on South Fourth street. In connection with the south-side sewer meeting, Mr. Swearingen stated that the first question to come up at the meeting would be that of the cost of the sewers. This, he stated, could not be furnished with the present data. Surveys have been run on the south side, but the plans have not been worked out to that point where he could give an approximation of the cost of the south side system. The main question to be brought before the meeting will be whether the south side people want Mr. Swearingen to go ahead with the plans, or not. The council does not want to expend the money for drafting the plans unless the residents in the district over the river think that they want them. The ordinance establishing a free employment agency in the city was read for the third time and approved by the council. The new office will

be established in the old fire hall for the present. It will be under the direct supervision of Commissioner Peat. It is probable that some member of the fire department will be designated as employment agent and will hold down the job during the time when there are no conflagrations. If the commissioner of public safety doesn't happen to be on the ground, a fire will temporarily vacate the position of employment agent. Don't put in your applications, or come to see if anything has turned up in the line of work, when a fire is in progress. Mayor Evans announced that a pavement meeting will be held in a short time to decide on what kind of pavement and how much of it is to be laid in Missoula next year. As it will take about two months to get the districts formed and the resolutions passed, the meeting will be called very soon. It is thought that it will take several meetings to get everything in shape so that bids can be advertised for.
