DRESS IDEAS SAVE

JOHN R. SMITH

MAN ARRESTED IN BUTTE GETS IN RIGHT BY NOT WEARING A COLLAR.

Yesterday's Anaconda Standard has the following concerning John R. Smith, who was arrested in Butte on the request of J. J. Welch of this city.

"Smith was represented by counsel and the latter asked that a bond be fixed for his client. He explained that Smith's offense was not a grave one, as he was en route from the Flathead country to his home in Colorado when he was taken off the train here on complaint of a creditor in Missoula.

"Judge Donlan said he had no sympathy for gun packers of any character and he said he would fix the bond at \$5,000.

"The attorney talked about the constitution and said that it did not contemplate the exaction of an excessive bond.

"Tell that to the next legislature," said Judge Donlan. Did you have a lot of money with you?" asked the judge, addressing Smith.

"No; but I had a lot of mining stock.

"Oh, that has no value now. You could pack a ton of it and no one would take it as a gift," said Judge Donlan. "Have you a family?"

"Smith said he had a wife and six children residing at Steamboat Springs, Colo., and that they were dependent on him for support. He said he did not know there was a law against carrying concealed weapons. He left his camp 4 miles from Kalispell and took the gun with him, going to Kalispell by stage. He had intended putting the gun in his grip on arriving at Kalispell, but did not have time, and so started on for Colorado.

"Well, your's seems to be an exceptional case," commented the judge. "If a man came in here wearing a high collar, long cuffs and who lives in luxury, I would not hesitate to make his bond \$10,000."

"I don't wear high collars," said Smith.

"I notice that you do not, and it is so much the better for you."

"Judge Donlan then placed the bond at \$500, and Smith said he would be able to furnish it."

PROPERTY IS TAKEN BY CREDITORS

MINE MACHINERY ATTACHED BY SHERIFF TO SETTLE CLAIMS AGAINST OWNERS.

Wallace, Dec. 10.—(Special).—Accompanied by his attorney, Carlton Fox, Manager James H. Taylor of the Coeur d'Alene Iron works, who is also a heavy creditor, and two deputy sheriffs, A. J. Cook went to the Lead-Silver Mining company's property on Nine Mile yesterday and levied on everything loose that could be found, to satisfy a judgment obtained some time ago. The attachment was afterwards released by a bond which was furnished by a bonding company. The terms of the latter, it is alleged, have not been complied with, and only about \$500 has been paid on the account.

A search of the mine by the party named above, revealed the property sought, and it is being removed and brought to Wallace. Practically every loose article about the property was placed under attachment yesterday, including timbers, candles and powder, steel, drills and hammers. A deputy sheriff was stationed at the mine to guard the property, some of which must remain where it is until several scheduled sales are held, or until the claims are met.

The suspension is the climax of a series of difficulties, and follows a tempestuous summer and fall, during which the company has been the subject of numerous attachment suits, and has had one strike among its employees. The Washington Water Power company has shut off its current, which gave the mine its power, and the 45 or more employees have been dismissed. With the pumps stopped, the lower levels are rapidly filling with water.

function of the modern army to be the school of the citizen soldier as opposed to those who contend that it should be a permanent organization of professional soldiers. Therefore, the secretary disapproves of the long term of enlistment and favors the shortening of the present term to less than three years, so as to allow as many men as possible to go through the training of the regular army, the government retaining some hold over the discharged soldier by which he can be called to the colors in case of war.

The secretary denounces as shortsighted a system which fails to distinguish between hardened criminals and thoughtless offenders against military law and declares for immediate and radical reform in the army prisons.
