WABASH IS TARGET OF TRADERS

AT OPENING OF MARKET PRESURE IS DIRECTED AGAINST WEAK ROAD.

New York, Dec. 19.—Recessions of small fractions occurred in most of the active stocks when trading began today. There was pressure against the Wabash securities as a result of the appointment of receivers for the road, but this action had been largely discounted and the losses were not severe. Wabash preferred fell to 15 1/2, the lowest price of the year, the common stock lost 1/4 and the 4 per cent bonds a point. The only issue to show marked strength was Canadian Pacific, which rose nearly a point. Extensive realizing in Lehigh Valley and liquidation in the various Gould stocks caused the general market to give way still further. Decline reached a point in Anaconda, American Smelting preferred, Lehigh Valley and Denver & Rio Grande, 1 1/2 in the preferred, 1 3/4 in Wabash and 1 1/4 in the preferred. There was a partial recovery before 11 o'clock.

Bear traders resumed their attack on the stock market. They carried on their operations for a time on the unfavorable effect produced by the Wabash receivership. After the first hour the list rallied.

The Gould issues did not share in the improvement to any great extent with the exception of the Wabash bonds, which were bought on the announcement that the January interest on the 4s would be paid. All trace of the heaviness in the general market vanished during the second hour. Prices rose steadily until the representative issues were generally ruling above yesterday's closing. Union Pacific rose 1/4 and Reading 1/2. Bonds were irregular.

Expectations that the negotiations by the International Harvester company with the government would be concluded satisfactorily caused a demand for this stock, which advanced 3 points. Elsewhere the movement was trivial aside from the southern group. Louisville & Nashville and Atlantic Coast Line gained over a point each. Wabash 4s were bought heavily and touched 52 1/2, compared with 50 at the outset and 51, yesterday's close.

The market closed irregular. Representative stocks began to figure more prominently in the dealings when speculation was revived in United States Steel on a large scale. The stock moved up steadily until it touched 69 1/2, an overnight rise of 1 1/2. Among the standard railroad stocks there was increased buying of Union Pacific, Reading and the southern group. Large orders came into the market for the fertilizer group, causing a jump of 2 points in American Cotton Oil. Lehigh Valley showed a leading tendency and ended the day with a loss of about a point. A slight reaction in United States Steel caused some irregularity in the final dealings.
