BOISE BANK EXPLODES.

Boise, Dec. 20.—The Boise State bank, a minor institution, was closed today by State Bank Examiner V. W. Platt. Its liabilities are figured at \$188,000, to meet which are assets estimated at \$105,000. The Boise Clearing House association at a meeting today declared the failure due to bad loans and incompetent management. The failure caused no flurry. The other banks report no indication of it in their business. There were 300 depositors, all having small accounts. It is doubtful if the bank will pay more than 50 cents on the dollar, and it will require a year or more to do that, in the opinion of experts.

BUFFALO ILL.

Helena, Dec. 20.—Black leg is epide-mic among the buffalo in Yellow-stone national park, according to a report sent to the interior department by Dr. E. J. Carrie of this city. He was employed by the government to investigate the deaths of 18 young buffalo last fall of 1911. Many other animals are infected, he says. He has telegraphed for black leg vaccine and an assistant veterinarian.

LAWYER IS GUILTY OF TAKING MONEY

Los Angeles, Dec. 20.—Fred H. Thompson, a criminal lawyer promi-nent in southern California, was found guilty today of having accepted \$15,000 from Orlando Altorre, a clerk in the money order department of the Los Angeles postoffice, knowing the money to have been stolen. He will be sen-tenced next Wednesday. Altorre, who was convicted of stealing \$15,000 from the postoffice money order depart-ment, was sentenced to the Leavenworth prison, but later was pardoned by President Taft and testified against Thompson. Thompson was the at-torney for Altorre when the latter was tried for the theft of the money pack-ages, and, according to Altorre's testi-mony, the attorney forced thousands of dollars from him by threats of throwing up his case and revealing the fact that he was guilty.

HAY REPLIES.

Washington, Dec. 20.—Representa-tive James Hay of Virginia, chairman of the house military affairs commit-tee, has issued a statement replying to the criticism of his army reorgan-ization bill contained in the annual re-port of Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the army. Mr. Hay declares that General Wood has changed front since he appeared before the committee last summer. The Hay bill will be introduced when the army appropriation measures come be-fore the house.

Many per-sonal letters also were written by at-torneys to Mr. Taft and to Mr. Dixon in support of Cheadle.
