## IMPRISONED PASTOR TRIES SUICIDE

Boston, Dec. 20.—Cries and groans breaking the stillness of the early morning hours at the Charles street jail today led to the discovery that Rev. Clarence V. T. Richeson, awaiting trial on the charge of having murdered Miss Avis Linnell, had mutilated himself severely with a piece of tin.

found necessary to perform an operation immediately. Later in the day surgeons said the operation was entirely successful and that unless blood poisoning developed the prisoner probably would recover within two weeks. County authorities, jail officials and counsel for Richeson all refused to comment upon the possible mental processes that led the accused man to injure himself, or what influence his act might have upon future legal proceedings in his case. District Attorney Pelletier, who will have charge of Richeson's trial, set for January 16, made a brief statement in which he asserted that the trial would begin on the date assigned. District Attorney Joseph C. Pelletier described the situation briefly in an official statement as follows: "About 4 o'clock this morning while in his cell Richeson inflicted a severe lacerated wound on himself with what apparently is a piece of tin can. Medical and surgical assistance was at once summoned and an operation was immediately performed. "I am advised by the doctors that his condition is not dangerous and it has not been necessary to remove him from the jail. The trial will be started on the date originally assigned, January 16."

The district attorney said that Richeson would be strong enough to appear in court on January 16 was corroborated by Dr. Howard A. Lot-

rop, one of the surgeons who attended the prisoner. Although Richeson's counsel would give no intimation whether the defense would seek a postponement or take any other action because of Richeson's act, he did say that the accused clergyman had wounded himself in an attempt at emasculation. It was about 4 a. m. when a jail attendant heard Richeson crying, "Doctor, oh, doctor! Doctor, quick!" The attendant summoned two other attendants and they found the prisoner lying on the floor, bleeding, and suffering intense pain. "I've cut myself—I'm bleeding to death," Richeson told them. The prison doctor said an immediate

operation was necessary and three surgeons were summoned. The operation occupied considerable time and at its conclusion it was announced that it had been successful and the prisoner was expected to make a speedy recovery. When Richeson came from under the influence of the anesthetic, he had nothing to say. By order of the surgeons he was not questioned by anyone and will be kept quiet until he gains strength. ## CLANCEY IS SHOWN M'ANIGAL

Los Angeles, Dec. 20.—With Ortiz E. McManigal, confessed dynamiter, located where he could see every witness called, the federal grand jury resumed its investigation of the alleged nation-wide dynamite conspiracy this afternoon. The session followed unexpected developments of the morning, when McManigal was brought face to face with E. A. Clancey, a San Fran-

cisco labor leader, in the private offices of the government's officials. What bearing the morning meeting had upon the question in McManigal's confession that he had been told by J. J. McNamara to meet a man named Clancey in San Francisco, when he came west upon a dynamiting expedition, could only be conjectured. Clancey left the offices pale and weak. McManigal was the first person other than attorneys to enter the chamber this afternoon. It was said he appeared briefly as a witness and then was posted in an anti-room through which all other witnesses had to pass. While there he would see Mrs. Belle Lavin, Mrs. Lena Ingeroll, Mrs. A. Brown and Mrs. Anton Johnson, all of San Francisco who were called.
