

GOVERNORS ARE OUT FOR PRESIDENT TAFT

Lineup Shows Nine Executives Declared for Taft and Seven for Roosevelt, With Three Claimed by Taft, One Out for La Follette and Two Whose Preference Is Not Announced.

Heads of Nine State Governments Send Telegraphic Reasons Why They Favor Renomination of the President to Succeed Self.

Washington, Feb. 27.—Telegraphic pledges of support from nine republican governors were given out tonight from the campaign headquarters of President Taft.

In addition to the signed statements made public, the Taft managers claimed the support of Eberhart, Illinois; Oddie, Nevada, and Mead, Vermont.

The announcement from the Taft bureau is taken as an answer to the Chicago conference of seven governors upon whose solicitation Colonel Roosevelt based his formal entry to the presidential contest.

Governors Accounted For.

Twenty-two states have republican governors and all are accounted for in the various statements of presidential preference as follows:

Declared for Taft, 9; claimed by Taft, 2; declared for Roosevelt, 7; declared for La Follette, 1; preference not announced, 2.

The governors who have declared for Roosevelt are Glasscock, West Virginia; Aitch, Nebraska; Bass, New Hampshire; Osborn, Michigan; Stubbs, Kansas; Hadley, Missouri; Johnson, California.

Governor Carey of Wyoming signed the governors' letter urging Colonel Roosevelt to become a candidate, but it is now asserted that he has "reserved judgment."

Neither has Governor Vessey of South Dakota, announced his choice. The California executive did not sign the letter, but has declared for the former president. Governor McGovern of Wisconsin is committed to La Follette.

Extracts.

The nine governors who have come out for President Taft take the position that his record entitles him to renomination. Following are extracts from the governors' dispatches:

Eberhart, Minnesota: "President Taft's administration, measured by all standards of achievement and fidelity to duty, entitles him to the indorsement of a second term, which I believe the American people will ungrudgingly give him."

Carroll, Iowa: "There is no justice in the opposition to President Taft. His administration has been clean and capable and in sympathy with the platform pledges. A just and righteous application of the square deal would accord him renomination without a contest."

Hay, Washington: "Few administrations can point to the enactment of so many wise and progressive laws as that of President Taft's. I feel it the duty of every true progressive republican to support Mr. Taft for renomination and re-election."

Goldsborough, Maryland: "It is my opinion that President Taft has given the country one of the best administrations in its history. I firmly believe that when the record of the republican party under his wise leadership is fully made known to the people they will rally to his standard, re-nominate and re-elect him."

Angry, All Right.

The colonel turned sharply about and fled into the clubhouse. "Yes," he confirmed later, "I was angry. It isn't right. My picture has been taken several thousand times since I came to Boston, and I haven't even changed my hat."

Colonel Roosevelt will attend the meeting of the Harvard board of overseers tomorrow, take luncheon with Arthur Hill, a leader of the Roosevelt movement here, and start for New York at 3 p. m.
