MISSOULA COMPANY WINS CASE

DISTRICT COURT AFFIRMED IN LERCH-MISSOULA BRICK & TILE COMPANY SUIT.

Helena, March 29.—(Special).—When land is leased so that by the terms of the lease there is violation of the provisions of section 4465 of the revised codes providing, "That no lessee grant of agricultural land for a longer period than ten years, in which shall be reserved any rent or service of any kind, shall be valid," the lease ceases to be operative, was the substance of an opinion by the supreme court today affirming the judgment of the district court at Missoula in favor of the defendant in the suit of Anton Lerch and his wife to annul a 99-year lease given by them in 1909 to the Missoula Brick & Tile company.

The plaintiffs leased three acres of orchard and meadow land to the defendant, the lessee, under the terms of the contract, taking the land for the purpose of using "the same in, about or in connection with his business of manufacturing brick, tile, etc."

The court says that "if a fair interpretation of the lease as written discloses the fact that the right of the lessee to use the land was strictly limited to other than agricultural purposes, then the lease is not valid. When a lease of land is made ostensibly for purposes other than agricultural and the land so leased cannot by the terms of the lease, either expressly or implied, be put to agricultural use, by the lessee, the purpose of the statute has been satisfied and the land in effect ceases to be agricultural within the meaning of the law, although susceptible of use for agricultural purposes."

After analyzing the lease in this action the opinion continues: "We are clearly of the opinion that the contract between the parties amounted in effect to a sale of so much of the soil as might become necessary, from time to time, for the purpose of manufacturing brick and tile, and a lease of sufficient surface ground, within the limits described, to carry on its operations, and no more; and that the lease is, partly by express agreement and partly by necessary implication, prohibited from using any portion of the ground for agricultural purposes."

Holding that the district court of Silver Bow was in error in refusing to give an instruction asked for by the defendant, the supreme court today, in an opinion by Chief Justice Bradley, reversed and remanded for a new trial the suit of Robert Richter and Gustav Nicholas, doing business as the Crystal Ice company, against Peter Linden and Mrs. Peter Linden, doing business as the Orofino Ice company.

The judgment in favor of C. E. Sandeen against the Russell Lumber company, obtained in the district court at Billings, was affirmed in an opinion by Associate Justice McHenry. Sandeen sued to recover damages for an alleged breach of contract. He contracted to purchase from the defendant hay and oats, the defendant failed to fulfill the terms and the plaintiff sued for \$1,875, being forced to buy hay and oats in the market at prices greater than the contract called for.
