

## TEACHERS PREPARE FOR MEETINGS

INLAND EMPIRE ASSOCIATION HOLDS ITS ANNUAL GATHERING NEXT WEEK.

Wallace, March 30.—(Special).—With the joint meeting of the Shoshone and Kootenai county teachers to be held in Coeur d'Alene but three days off and the Spokane meeting of Inland Empire instructors less than a week distant, Miss Frances Wilson, interested in the first meeting, and W. P. Smith, largely responsible for the second program, are both confident of record-breaking attendances. Both predict that these gatherings will be unusual in their exceedingly high character.

Miss Wilson, head of the schools of this county, in speaking of the Coeur d'Alene gathering, stated yesterday that practically every teacher in the two counties will be present. "Sickness is the only thing that will keep Shoshone county teachers away," said Miss Wilson.

Drawing conclusions from the many assurances which are reaching from parts of the two states, Mr. Smith feels that he is safe in predicting the largest attendance in the history of the Inland Empire association when the instructors gather in Spokane Wednesday and Thursday.

"As the time draws near for the annual meeting of the Inland Empire Teachers' association it seems to me that the prospects are better with each succeeding day," writes Henry B. Dewey, superintendent of schools in the state of Washington. "I have had occasion to visit many sections of this state and I find that nearly every section will be represented. I anticipate that this will be the largest educational meeting ever held in the northwest."

C. A. Dunaway, president of the University of Montana and president of the Inland Empire association, writes that "the prospects point to the largest delegation from Montana that has ever attended a meeting of the Inland Empire teachers." This delega-

## SOCIALIST NOTES

Professor Palmer's address on "The Future of Literature of the Imagination," was pronounced excellent by all who heard it. A good attendance at the local Sunday afternoon constituted Professor Palmer's audience. At the conclusion of the address questions were asked by those who dissented from some of the views advanced by the professor, and also by others who wished to emphasize a thought. A vote of thanks was given Professor Palmer, who is the first of the university faculty to recognize the desire of the socialists for greater knowledge. Socialism is a great educational movement; doubtless the greatest the world has ever known. It has revolutionized the teaching of history by making it a chronicle of the growth of the human race and not the annals of wars and rulers. History, as taught today, is a subject of absorbing interest. The advanced class of the socialist school has discovered this in following the story of the settlement and growth of our own country.

If China has reached its present civilization through the labors of missionaries, it is time to call them home to help raise the standard of civilization in England and America. We need them and the Chinese can now dispense with such services as they have granted the ballot to women and in other ways proved that they are rapidly distancing in progressiveness the Anglo-Saxon nations.

The socialist Lyceum lectures are to be given next year. Arrangements are likely to be made for a short as well as a long course. This will make it possible for weaker locals to undertake the course and derive the benefit to be obtained from this new educational movement. Those who attended the socialist lectures given here last winter learned, at least, that socialists do not believe in "dividing up," free love or any of the other dreadful things which are commonly attributed to them; they also learned not to confound socialism with anarchy. The enlightenment of this community with regard to socialism did not end with the lectures, for at least \$500 worth of socialist books and periodicals are still carrying the message of true democracy to more than 500 people.

Did the working men of Missoula read with care the recent report of the inquest held over the body of Frank Kellogg, who was killed a few days ago in the Rock Island "riots," and the press comments on the event? If not, it would be well for them to study the article in question, for it contains a deadly menace to the whole working class, against which it is directed. The press report says: "Although it is known that the deceased fell by one of the bullets fired by the police, who attempted to quell the mob, yet the result of the verdict is in doubt. Ringleaders of the mob may be charged with the death, as they are now accused of being accessories to the police methods made necessary by the question is ours, by the riot violence. Indictments ordering the arrest of several hundred men are expected." This inquest is carried on under the protection of 200 militiamen

and the same means, apparently, are to be used against the leaders of this so-called "riot" which cutted off or to be sent to jail and held there with out bail. Evident accusation against leaders of the riot there will be the semblance of law, but how about its justice? It is time the workers began to realize that laws, which had their origin in a desire to protect society, are to be interpreted henceforth solely in the interest of the masters of the bread. Is it surprising that there is a prevalent lack of respect for the decisions of our courts?

Statistics just published show that the greatest number of immoral or criminal women are recruited from domestic service and yet girls have been exhorted to enter domestic service in preference to other employments, as it was said that there was less temptation in home life for the unprotected. Now it should be revealed why there is the greatest danger in domestic service. Many of our pet theories need to be revolutionized.

Wallace, March 30.—(Special).—Homeless children in Idaho who are given into the keeping of the Children's Home Finding association, at Lewiston, will be surrounded with every comfort, and will live in a palatial residence until permanent homes are found for them. This statement was made yesterday by Rev. S. B. Chase, who is in charge of the home. Mr. Chase came to Wallace to investigate two or three cases that had been referred to him, but decided to let the matter rest until the county commissioners held their next session, when action will be taken by them.

The association has just purchased for \$14,000 a building erected by W. A. Hilbert, former banker of Lewiston, at a cost of nearly double the amount which it sold for. It is a beautiful building, thoroughly modern, has 28 rooms and is delightfully situated on a plot of ground embracing six lots on Blanchard Heights. It is expected that it will be ready for occupancy within a week or 10 days.
