EVERYTHING READY FOR TODAY

VICTOR PEOPLE PREPARED TO ENTERTAIN INTERSCHOLASTIC VISITORS.

Victor, May 2.—(Special).—Victor is preparing for the big county interscholastic events on Friday and Saturday of this week.

The hotels and homes will be taxed to their limit to provide accommodations for the crowds of visitors.

Principal Holst reports nearly 150 entries for the meet, and he says that all the high schools of the county are helping to make the meet a success.

Victor is attempting to entertain all contestants and chaperons free.

One chaperon is allowed for each grade school having a spelling team at the meet and two chaperons are allowed for each high school taking part in both athletic and forensic events.

The Ravalli hotel will serve 35-cent meals at the hotel and 25-cent meals at a building secured for the meet.

The track has been put in fine shape. The capacity of the bleachers has been more than doubled and the track has been fenced in.

Tents and stoves will be provided for all participating teams.

The Victor Commercial company has secured banners and pennants for all the schools, and its store building is in gay attire.

The window is lined with black velvet and on this the cups and medals are displayed.

The curtains back of this are hung with pennants and banners. On the walls of the store above the shelves on one side are displayed banners representing every high school in the valley.

The banners are two feet by six, on colors of the school represented.

The officers of the meet will be the officers of the county association and men from the university.

Robert Cary will act as referee, starter and clerk of the course. All judges and inspectors will be from the university.

All stores will close on Saturday afternoon between the hours of 1 and 5.
