Erickson and Warren Are Not Effective and Highlanders Are Not in Trouble to Any Extent—Zamloch Gets by With Great Enthusiasm.

Now, for the benefit of those fans who couldn't make the grade to the grounds yesterday, there will be re-acted how the 17 counts of the contest came. First, the home-grown article will be epitomized: Wood, the Saxon-haired shortstop of the visitors, a gentleman with a checkered career in the Union association, gave us a good start for the first run, which was accumulated in the initial round. Warren's rap was lost by Wood and a moment later Wood dropped Stevens' peg when Jackie went down. Perrine sacrificed and Warren came home on Bassey's sacrifice fly.

We didn't score again for a while. In the third the Highlanders took two, however. Warren slammed a line drive into centerfield territory and Perrine was there with the inevitable sacrifice. Bassey's single let Warren count. Oriet's triple to deep center scored Bassey.

The Highlanders enjoyed another tally in the fifth. Bassey, who was making himself a factor right along, popped a Texas leaguer into leftfield and stole second. Oriet walked and Carman's sacrifice advanced two. Tobin grounded to Erickson and was out at first. Changnon was hit and Roberts caught another with his person, forcing in Bassey. Zamloch, who later in the game contributed a triple, filed out with the bases full.

Four times did a Highlander bite his initials in the plate in the sixth. Warren was given a free ride and went to second on a passed ball. Immediately before Perrine was also walked. Bassey's single scored Warren. Nick taking third. Oriet's sacrifice fly scored Perrine. Carman hit to Wessler and was called out at first. 
