ATELL IS WINNER OVER JACKSON AT FORT

DENVER FEATHER IS GIVEN DECISION AT THE END OF TEN FAST ROUNDS.

COLORADO BOY IS GOOD

Margin by Which Victory is Awarded is So Small That Draw Would Have Been Acceptable to Many of Spectators--Negro Breaks His Hand.

It was Young Abe Attehl's glove that Umpire McCaffery raised after 10 good rounds in the Fort Missoula arena last night, but the Denver boy had not outclassed Young Jackson, the clever dinger from Boston and Butte. The fight was the prettiest staged at the fort up to date in which imported talent was concerned and the fans were pleased with the exhibition. Satisfied with the referee's verdict were most of the bugs, too, although many who had watched the negro's clever defensive work and had admired the gameness with which he continued to fight back, thought that Attehl's shade was not enough to warrant any decision at all. A draw would have been satisfactory to a lot of people.

A synopsis of the fight:

Round One--They clinched and there was no advantage in the infighting to either. They broke and the colored boy scored in a lively rally. The lads clinched and traded kidney blows. Jackson ripped his left to Attehl's stomach. Attehl landed a straight right into Jackson's face and met a rush with a left that brought the Butte boy standing up straight. Attehl led a straight left to the face and took a good wallop on the jaw. A rally was for Jackson.

Round Two--They rushed together and Attehl worked right and left to the face, taking a few light and half-blocked body punches. A fierce exchange woke up the fans, but little damage was done. The Hebrew took one in the dinner spot and the dusky one in the corresponding spot on the nose. A left started Jackson's nose to leaking red, but Jackson slipped in two hooks, right and left, and danced away. They clinched again and, on the breakaway, the dinger clipped Able a peach on the jaw. Attehl fell to his knees, but was up in a trice and fighting fast. Abraham popped Jackson on the back once more as the gong clanged.

Round Three--They clinched and exchanged a lot of kidney blows. In a rush Attehl slipped to the floor. Attehl stopped a rush with a straight right and, after a clinch, used his left in the same way. Able's left shot to the wind and they fiddled. The Jew's left was being used with good effect and he had the advantage of some hot infighting. Attehl swung to the face again and Jackson missed a vicious swing as the bell rang.

Round Four--They sparred at long range and clinched. On the breakaway both missed swings. Jackson led for Able's head, upset him and dodged one himself. Attehl counted twice on the negro's head and face and there was more blood. They clinched and both hung onto the ropes. Both seemed tired. Attehl rushed Jackson to the ropes again and hooked a wicked right to the face. Jackson was coming back strongly at the bell.

Round Five--Jackson was on the aggressive and the fighters clinched, doing the usual swapping. A hot exchange at close quarters was seen. Attehl, rushing Jackson, was butted, accidentally, and they hung onto each other. Attehl missed a left that would have stopped a rush and took a right uppercut. They clinched and Jackson ducked a right swing on the break. Jackson felted for an opening and got it, but failed to land. He hung on a minute and then they fought all over the ring. Jackson looked worried at the round's end.

Round Six--They mixed it in the middle of the ring. Jackson took a healthy and missed, but recovered and lifted a left into the stomach. Abe sent right and left to the negro's swollen bugle and drove an uppercut that was blocked. They staled a bit and clinched. Jackson was wrestled to the rope but came back fast. Jackson failed to hear the bell and Abe lost his temper. The referee jumped between the two feathers.

Round Seven--They rushed into a clinch with a much pep as in the opener. Abe faltered with his left and Jackson retaliated in part. Attehl opened a cut over Jackson's left eye with a straight right and missed a left swing. They fell into a clinch. Attehl worked his right to the face and wrestled the negro to the ropes in the clinch that followed.

Round Eight--In the usual opening tactics Attehl was against the ropes, but in a minute he had Jackson hanging on. They exchanged at long range without damage. Jackson took a light right to the face and did some mighty clever blocking in later clinches. Attehl fought the colored boy to the ropes and both slowed up a little.

Round Nine--They traded in the clinch that opened the round. Jackson missed and took a stiff right in the face. They sparred. Jackson shot his right into Abe's side, below the ribs. Attehl ducked two swings and hooked a hot one inside Jackson's guard. Abe took one in the stomach

while going away. They rushed and sparred, sparred and rushed. Abe worked his left to the face, but the blow was half blocked. There was blood in the black boy's eyes and he couldn't see, but he protected himself admirably.

Attehl's round, shade.

Round Ten--They shook hands on the run and bored in. The infighting was speeded up again and was for 10 days. Attehl and Jackson will go 15 rounds at the fort.

The time that will intervene will suffice for the healing of Jackson's hand, which he injured in the third round last night and broke in the sixth. He is a gamester, this colored boy, and despite the handicap of his color, made friends for himself last night.

Attehl is as clever as they come and will go a long way up, provided, of course, that he takes care of himself. Attehl did some splendid work last night.

Soldier Billie Duncan, introduced as the champion lightweight of the army, knocked out Kid McClain, "the man of mystery," in two minutes and 45 seconds of the first round of a scheduled 10-round bout. McClain took a left in the solar plexus, after making a whirlwind start. Duncan showed champion's form, all right.

Maurice Thompson and Jimmie Cannon, who fight tonight, were introduced and given a hand.

There was a fairly good house.
