Navin and Yawkey, the owners of the club. Hugh hasn't made good this year. He has failed, and said club owners are getting excited. Not the club owners alone, but the fans. They are all clamoring for his scalp. The principal trouble with the Tiger leader seems to be that he has lost his power to command as well as lead his men. They have lost their interest in baseball, and the result may be seen in their lowly position in the American league. Jennings declares his willingness to leave Detroit if the owners of the club want him no longer. "I am as much dissatisfied with the club as anyone else," he said recently. DISCARDED CURTAINS. There is no need for throwing away old curtains.
