BUTTE IS CHOSEN AS MEETING PLACE FOR 1913 SHOOT BY MARKSMEN.

COMPETITION IS SHARP.

In All of Eleven Events of Concluding Day the Contests Are Close and Shoot-Offs Are Frequent—Several Good Scores Are Recorded.

Helena, July 16.—At the annual meeting of the Montana State Sportsmen's association this evening Butte was selected for the place of holding the next annual shoot and officers were elected as follows: President, C. C. Goddard, Butte; vice president, Thomas Rowe, Butte; secretary and treasurer, C. H. Smith, Butte; directors, Nelson Storey, Jr., Bozeman; W. A. Selvidge, Helena; James Drumgoole, Anaconda.

A resolution was adopted strongly commending State Game Warden Henry Avare and the members of the state board of fish commissioners. Following the annual meeting the shotgun artists were entertained at an elaborate smoker at the Montana club. All of the 11 events shot off were hotly contested, about 55 entering in each. Harker, Selvidge and Weatherhead won the three-man team shoot with a score of 63 out of a possible 75. Weaver, Parsons and Tilzey came second with 61. The Brownlee challenge medal was won by Talbot, who scored 24 out of 25. The Butte Rod and Gun club trophy was tied for by Weatherhead and Sanborn, who broke 34 targets out of 40. Sanborn won on the shoot-off with 15 against Weatherhead's 11. The usual amount of ties marked each of the sweepstake events.

The day was perfect and a large audience was in attendance at the grounds.
