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LOAN ASSOCIATION IS SAID TO BE INSOLVENT

PROMINENT SAN FRANCISCO CONCERN TAKEN OVER BY STATE COMMISSIONER.

San Francisco, Aug. 8.—The Continental Building and Loan association, one of the oldest and largest on the Pacific coast, will close its doors tomorrow. At a stormy session of the board of directors, John S. Walker, state building and loan commissioner, served notice this afternoon that he had found the association insolvent and should take over its affairs.

WILL FURNISH FUNDS.

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PRESIDENT OF HAYTI BLOWN TO ETERNITY

Palace at Port Au Prince Is Set on Fire by Powder Explosion and Hundreds of People Perish or Are Hurt in Subsequent Explosions---Executive's Body Is Not Recovered.

Port Au Prince, Hayti, Aug. 8.—The national palace was blown up today by a powder explosion and burned to the ground and the president of the republic, General Cincinnatus Leconte, perished. Many palace attendants were killed and it is estimated the casualty list will reach 100 persons killed or injured.

and senate this afternoon General Tancrede Auguste, senator and ex-minister of public works, was named as president. The explosion occurred at 3:15 o'clock this morning and the shock shattered the palace. Fire followed quickly and the palace, a wooden structure, was consumed within half an hour.

Washington, Aug. 8.—The Haytian minister to Washington, Solon Metos, today received from his government confirmation of the palace explosion and the killing of the president. The explosion was accidental and resulted from a fire in the powder magazine, his advisers say.

J. D. ROCKEFELLER, JR., AIDS PROBE OF NEW YORK POLICE

New York, Aug. 8.—The fact became known today that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., has been instrumental in obtaining evidence of police graft which he has turned over to District Attorney Whitman for use in connection with the investigation of alleged corruption among high police officials that has grown out of the murder of Herman Rosenthal.
