## LOTTERY IS DENIED BY TRIO

MEN ARRESTED IN TACOMA SAY THEY ARE ENGAGED IN A LEGITIMATE BUSINESS.

Tacoma, Aug. 16.—Denying that there was any lottery connected with their real estate scheme, by which it is alleged many women were induced to come to their offices on the promise of free lots near Guerneville, Sonoma county, California, W. C. Taylor, R. L. Miller and E. J. Carpenter have employed counsel to defend them and say they will begin action for false arrest. The men, who operated what was known as the West Coast Land company, which, according to Carpenter, has acted as Tacoma agent for a large San Francisco company, explained their method of getting customers as follows:

They called upon persons in residence district, gave coupons in return for names and addresses and shortly afterward notified each that he or she was entitled to a free lot. If these called at the office they were told that they could have the lot free if certain improvements were made and if not, at a price named. Opportunity also was taken to urge the purchase of an adjoining lot. The arrests were made on the instance of Assistant Prosecuting Attorney Thompson, whose wife was among those notified that she had won a free lot. He says he has received no less than two dozen complaints against the men. The authorities are now investigating to determine if the accused hold any land in California. Carpenter was released tonight on bail but his two partners were unable to raise bail.

## CROPS ARE SUFFERING FROM EXCESSIVE RAIN

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 16.—Wheat, hay and fruit crops of this section of the state are suffering a great deal as a result of the almost unprecedented rains of the past two days. Only three times prior to this August in the history of the local weather office has there been so much rain as this year. Over half an inch has fallen the past two days and tonight rain is still falling. The wheat crop of this section is estimated at 5,500,000 bushels this year and one-third the crop remains uncut, while heavy loss has been sustained where grain is sacked in the fields but not covered. The early fruit crop is suffering while much damage has been done to hay.

# PRESS ASSOCIATION ENJOYS DAY

SPLENDID TRIPS AND "EATS" EXTENDED BY PEOPLE OF DEER LODGE COUNTY.

Anaconda, Aug. 16.—(Special)—The Montana Press association had one continuous round of pleasure today and finished off the jollification with a business session at Gregson Springs that cleared the way for another good time tomorrow. The convention assembled this morning in Standard hall and was welcomed to the city by C. H. Bagleston in a few fitting remarks to which President O. M. Lanstrum responded, accepting the hospitalities prospective. A report of the committee on legislation was read and was referred to a committee consisting of Messrs. Fred Whiteside, J. A. Gilluly and Frank Wright.

The roll call of the state by counties showed a remarkable number of new papers started since the last session, most of which were represented and applied for admission into the association. The time for the convention was cut short by the appointed hour for the trip to Warm Springs, where J. M. Scanland was to be the host at luncheon. The report was more than a luncheon, it was a banquet, served under the pleasing shade on the lawn of the Montana state asylum. The viands, the service and all, with the appetites whetted by the whirl across the famous Deer Lodge county roads, was one long to be held in pleasant recollection. At its conclusion President Lanstrum called up George B. Conway of Helena, who responded to the toast "Montana" with a broad view of the resources and possibilities of all sections of the state. Lieutenant Governor W. R. Allen spoke eloquently of the work of the editors of the state in helping its onward progress. President E. P. Mathewson made an enthusiastic address on the good roads for the state in behalf of the good roads congress and asked the support of the editors in continuing the work that has been so well begun. Fred Whiteside made a humorous address and E. H. Cooney was called upon to express the appreciation of the hospitality extended by Dr. Scanland. He called for a rising vote of thanks that was very heartily given.

## Valley Toured.

A tour of the Deer Lodge valley by automobiles extending over more than two hours followed by which the press association was shown all sections of the grand valley with its flourishing crops of growing grain and meadow lands. They reached Gregson Springs about 5 o'clock and there they were guests of Manager Hugh Daly who extended all the courtesies of the new rebuilt hostelry and the big plunge.
