

MARKET MOVEMENT IS DULL

LAST WEEK'S BANK STATEMENT IS A FEATURE IN WALL STREET TRADING.

New York, Sept. 16.—Last week's bank statement, which showed a slight strengthening of the reserve, instead of threatened deficit, and an engagement of \$750,000 gold in the London market—the first in over two years—were factors in today's fairly steady, but dull market.

There was a firmer tendency of the money market. Call loans opened at 5 per cent, going to 5 1/2 per cent in the final hour, although demand was not especially keen, a fortunate fact in view of the increasing of the diminution of supply.

Most of today's business on the exchange was in the various specialties, including the coppers, China scoring a new high record, the equipments, filices, American Can, Peoples Gas and local traction, St. Paul, Great Northern, Northern Pacific and Lehigh Valley, were in moderate demand as also was Reading at the outset. In the late dealings pressure against Reading had an unsettling effect on the other active issues, causing an irregular close. London was a moderate buyer of coppers and Hill issues in this market, selling Union Pacific and Reading. Money was plentiful at the British metropolis, where discounts again hardened.

Bonds continued their irregular trend, the only notable feature being an eight-point rise in China convertibles to 130, a high record.

Total sales, par value, \$1,825,000. United States government bonds were unchanged on call.
