

ITINERARY OF BRYAN MADE PUBLIC

"BOY ORATOR OF THE PLATTE" WILL SPEND TWO DAYS IN TREASURE STATE.

Helena, Sept. 18.—William J. Bryan will spend the next two days as the guest of Montana and while in the state will make three scheduled addresses and a number of platform talks. Colonel Bryan will arrive in Butte over the Oregon Short Line tomorrow afternoon at 5:10 o'clock, and at 8:30 will leave in a special train for Helena. A short stop will be made at Boulder and then a fast run will be made to Helena, where Mr. Bryan will deliver a speech at the Auditorium. Friday morning Colonel Bryan will go to Bozeman, where he will make a speech in the afternoon and for the evening will go to Butte, where another big meeting is planned. Colonel Bryan will leave Butte Friday night over the Oregon Short Line.

Accompanying Mr. Bryan on his tour of this state will be Sam V. Stewart of Virginia City, the democratic nominee for governor. A number of prominent Helena democrats will go to Butte tomorrow to meet the Nebraskan and accompany him to Helena. Mr. Bryan will speak at Idaho Falls, Idaho, Saturday morning, and at Pocatello Saturday evening. He will then go to Salt Lake.

ing member from Ohio, and J. A. Harris was elected successor to C. C. Priestly of Oklahoma. The following sub-committee was appointed by Chairman Hillis to consider the situation California: Samuel A. Perkins, Washington; Ralph Williams, Oregon, and Representative Ralph W. Cameron, Arizona. After luncheon there was a joint session of the national committee and the advisory committee, lasting until after 6 o'clock. Chairman Hillis reported that the situation in the various states in regard to the electors is now in good shape. He said that of the 100 electors on the republican ticket in several states who turned out to be Roosevelt men, all had been replaced except in Kansas, Nebraska and California. He added that the Kansas case is in the courts, the Nebraska case will be and that a special committee will arrange for a new organization in California and place 100 electors on the ticket under some other name than that of the republican party. Reports of conditions in their respective states were made by C. S. Warren, Michigan; John B. Hanna, Maryland; F. W. Estabrook, New Hampshire; Henry Roraback, Connecticut; Austin K. Colgate, New Jersey; Sherman M. Granger, Ohio; William Barnes, Jr., New York and John Hays Hammond, Mass.

A resolution was adopted calling on the electors of Nebraska and Kansas, who were named as republicans, but who are now for Roosevelt, to retire at once. The resolution said the position of electors is a position of trust and that these men owe a duty to the state as well as to themselves. Secretary Reynolds said after the meeting that everything was done in complete harmony and the vote to oust committeemen was unanimous in every case.

"CITY OF DIXON" TO BE LAUNCHED SATURDAY

Dixon, Sept. 18.—(Special.)—It was announced today by Captain Roberts that the launching of the "City of Dixon" would be celebrated next Saturday, September 21. All arrangements have been completed.
